

TWO KILLED WHEN **GANGSTERS STAGE** PISTOL BATTLE IN **NEW YORK STREET**

Bodies of Victims Are Riddled With Bullets.

ONE IS ARRESTED

Other Two Escape in Motor Car-Seven Safes Are Blown.

New York, Sept. 29.-Two men were killed and one wounded in a revolver battle by gunmen on the east side, and seven safes in one Canal street building were blown open by burglars early yes.

An automobile conveyed the gunmen to Catharine and Madison streets about 2 a.m. and three men, revolvers in hand, leaped from it, and ran to the corner, where they opened fire on three others standing there. One of the gangsters was arrested at nistel point by: standing there. One of the gangsters was arrested at pistol point by a patrolman arriving on the scene during the shooting. The others escaped in the car. Two of the men attacked were killed instantly, their bodies being riddled with bullets. Other arrests followed in Brooklyn, where the police claim to have tracked the murder car. In a loft building in Canal street, about the same time as the east side shooting, burglars dynamited seven safes, going through the structure in the most businesslike fashion. The police made one arrest later in the day on "suspicion of burglary."
