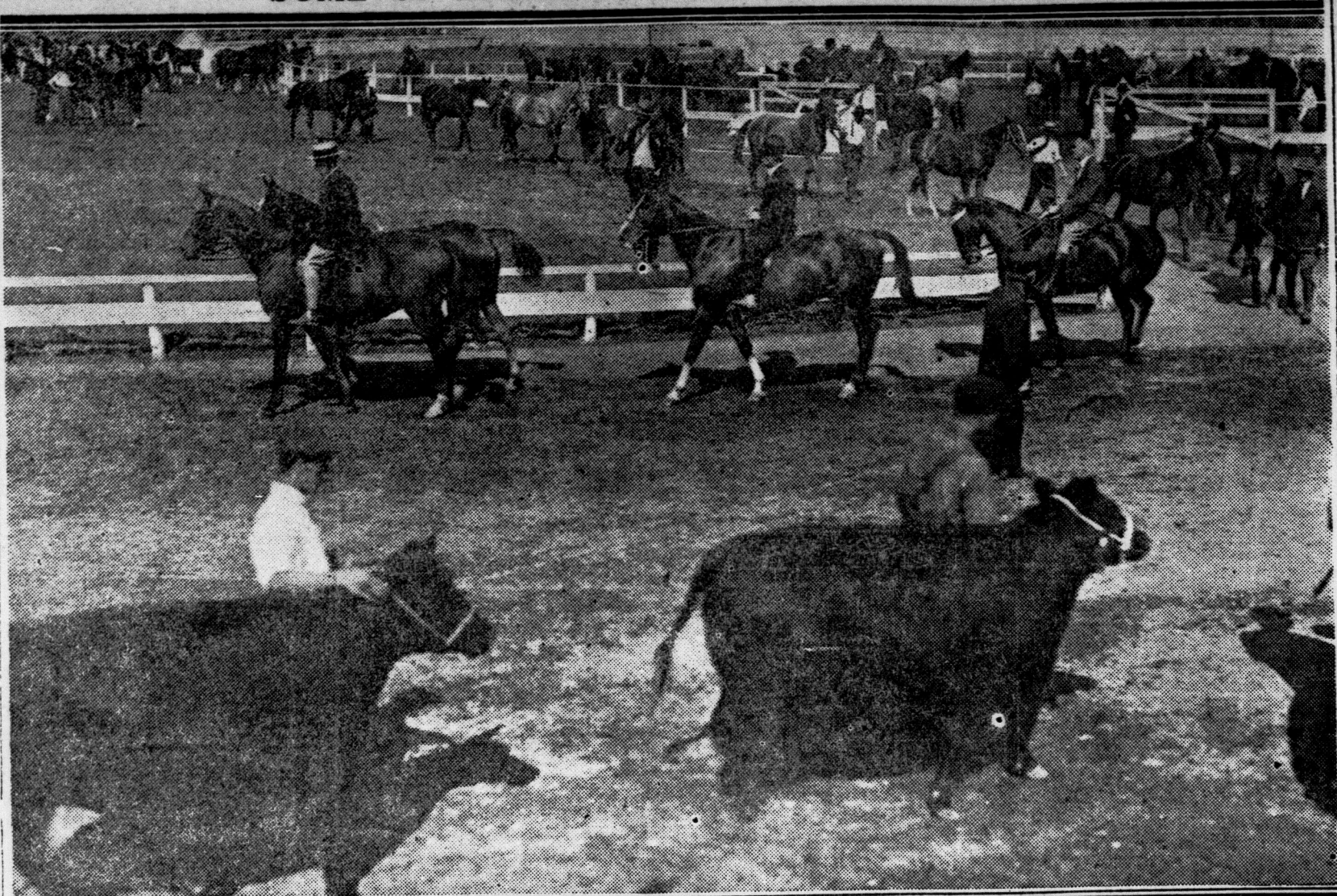

PREVIOUS RECORDS FOR FAIR CROWDS BELIEVED BROKEN

Every Part of Queen's Park Is Thronged — Week Before
Exact Figures Known—Today's Attendance Will
Be Large—Lower Prices On Friday.

Conservative estimates of the at-
tendance at the Western Fair Wednes-
day vary from 40,000 to 55,000. Every
part of the grounds was thronged, and
nowhere in Queen's Park could one
escape from the crowds or move about
except slowly and by dint of jostling
his neighbors. Until late in the evening
all the buildings were packed. Be-
tween 3,000 and 10,000 people packed the
grandstands in the afternoon, and the
crowd was fully as great in the evening.

The directors declined to make any
estimate of the throngs. It might be
a week before the exact figures would
be known, they stated. However,
several of them individually made
guesses ranging from 40,000 to 55,000.
While independent estimates hazarded
by people not officially connected with
the fair ranged up to 60,000 and even
higher, about 10,300 in the morning
and about 11,000 in the afternoon
incidents noted at the gates of the
grounds because of the delay resulting
from inadequate change booth facilities.
It was claimed that some fair visitors
amused at the delay and trouble get-
ting into the grounds returned uptown
and went to the theatres. Whether any
considerable number did this is doubt-
ful, but at any rate all the theatres
were crowded to capacity both after-
noon and evening.

Crowd Today.
Another large attendance is anticipated
today. Thursday's attendance is al-
ways swelled by the presence of people
who stay away on Wednesday to avoid
the crowds. As a result the attendance
of the two days is sometimes approxi-
mately equalized.

Complaints in some quarters locally
have been made about the increase
in the admission charge. Pessimists
claimed that thousands of citizens with
large families would not attend be-
cause of the 50-cent admission price.
In view of Wednesday's thronged at-
tendance, however, it is believed that
the increase in the price of the Fair man-
agement. If it is true that the in-
crease in the price of the Fair man-
agement will result in the lower prices
would have brought been possibly ac-
commodated in Queen's Park.

The lower price will prevail again
on Friday, when adults will be ad-
mitted for 25 cents and children for
10 cents. As all the exhibits will be
held in place until late Friday even-
ing, and the attractions will be quite
as good as on any other day, Friday's
attendance will indicate whether the
price of admission really makes very
much difference to Fair-goers.
