SENATORS AFTER ASQUITH FOR NOT FLYING THE FLAG

Time That He Should Be Informed That We'll Keep the Union Jack a-Flying.

OTTAWA, May 14.—(Special.)—Senator Landry was told in the senate today by Hon. Mr. Scott that the government had come to no decision as to taking over the liabilities of the Quebec Bridge Co., as it had authority to do under the contract of 1903. He was told that Mr. Parent had refused a bonus of \$3000 voted to him by the Quebec Bridge Co. after the bridge fell. Senator Landry was also told that orders had been given to expedite the work of repairing the walls in connection with a portion of the Dufferin Terrace at Quebec and it was expected that the Corporation of Quebec would be able to complete the terrace in time for the celebration.

Senator Domville read a despatch that the Prime Minister of the British House of Commons that he did not regard it advisable to order the hoisting of the Union Jack over public buildings on Empire Day. He asked what effect this was to have in Canada and what the effect of this would be in Canada on the occasion for the flag flying. Would the Union Jack be flown there.

Hon. Mr. Scott said there was no intention of restricting the flying of the Union Jack in Canada. If it was not flown in England, the only effect in Canada would be flying it more.

Mr. MacKenzie Bowell declared it was time to let the Premier of England know that Canada intended using the Union Jack whenever it pleased. An expression of opinion by the Canadian Parliament might not be out of place. Senator Cloran declared that if there was any man who should know when the Union Jack should be flown in Canada, it was the Premier of England, the chief adviser of His Majesty the King, Premier Asquith's opinion evidently was that the best evidence of loyalty was not in the flag but in the policy of the government.

COST OF THE MONTCALM.

Over \$100,000 Spent in Four Years on Repairs.

OTTAWA, May 14.—(Special.)—Mr. Brodeur told Mr. Taylor in the house today that the purchase price of the ice-breaker Montcalm was \$265,233; repairs for four years cost \$119,377, expended for furnishing \$6553 and total expenditure, including salaries of crew, \$387,725.

NEW YORK, May 14.—Lady Francis Cook, who before her marriage was Miss Tennessee Claflin of this city, sailed for Europe to-day on the steamer Baltic. Falling health has compelled her to give up all active work and upon the advice of her physicians she is going abroad for a period of complete rest and quiet at one of the European health resorts.

Upon her arrival here in April Lady Cook announced her intention of founding an institution to be called the School of Fatherhood and Motherhood, with a view to increasing knowledge of self among children upon their arrival at an age of understanding.

She purchased a site at Wheatley Hills, Long Island, and plans for the building have been prepared but the project has been temporarily abandoned because of her physical inability to carry on the work.

\$75,000 WILL BE SPENT ON TECHNICAL SCHOOL

Board of Education Decide to Build—Trustee Make Slighting Reference to Earl Grey.

HAMILTON, May 14.—(Special.)—The board of education this evening decided to erect a \$75,000 technical school in rear of the Collegiate Institute building, and the building committee was instructed to proceed at once with the erection of the building. By a vote of 5 to 4 the board agreed to allow the Hamilton branch of the Quebec Battlefields Association to open subscription lists and collect contributions in the public schools. Trustee Callaghan offered vigorous opposition. He said the scheme was only a fad of Governor-General Grey, who wanted to do something to make himself famous. He thought the government should use the revenue for purchasing the battlefields instead of squandering it. Contracts for eight room additions to both the Picton and Sophia-street schools were let, the cost being about \$40,000. Trustee Booker complained that some members of the Thirteenth and Ninety-First Regiments had acted like blackguards toward the collegiate students at Stony Creek last Sunday. R. Tasker Steele and Geo. Hope asked the board to join in the movement to provide more playgrounds for children, and the matter was referred to the internal management committee. Dr. B. Thomson was complimented upon the honor conferred upon him by McMaster University.

RUMPIUS IN THE HOUSE SOME WORDS WITHDRAWN

Jackson and Foster Run Foul of Each Other over a Letter From Cyr.

OTTAWA, May 14.—(Special.)—An amusing incident occurred to-day when Mr. Jackson (Selkirk) rose to a question of privilege.

It was not many minutes before he had thrown the house into disorder, which was only checked by the firmness and tact of Mr. Speaker Sutherland. Mr. Jackson read a letter from Mr. Cyr, the member for Provencher, who is ill and could not himself bring the matter to the attention of the house. Mr. Cyr complained of a statement by Mr. Foster declaring that he had been elected to the methods of Leech of thin red line name. The writer regretted his inability to be in the house to give Mr. Foster "the castigation which he so well deserved" for making a statement "which he knows to be untrue—"

Mr. Speaker listened attentively thus far, but did not allow this to pass and demanded a withdrawal. Mr. Jackson was willing to withdraw this when Mr. Foster asked if he had power of attorney from Mr. Cyr. Mr. Jackson then proceeded—"and which brands him as a falsifier."

A commotion ensued. Mr. Foster endeavoring to get a hearing while both sides yelled derisively at each other. The speaker intervened, but Mr. Jackson bobbed up and down. "It shows the ignorance of the hon. gentleman," he ejaculated, and here was another uproar. Mr. Speaker declaring the expression out of order.

Mr. Jackson again withdrew, on behalf of Cyr, and the matter was immediately on his feet, objecting to the letter being read, on the ground that the matter did not concern Jackson. Further, he demanded an implicit retraction.

"And I advise," he said, "and 'call the sergeant-at-arms,' Mr. Speaker decided, in the interest of decorum, that the letter should not be read. Hon. Mr. Sutherland approved the house for treating in levity a matter that concerned the privilege of the house and the decorum of debate.

The matter then dropped.

Mr. Robitaille next arose to what, he intimated, would be considered by Mr. Speaker, under the exceptional circumstances of the case, to be a question of privilege.

"I wish," he said, "to draw attention to the insulting remarks made by Mr. Hunter, deputy minister of public works, directed against French-Canadian employees in the department. As a member belonging to that nationality I feel personally insulted and therefore trust I shall be able to refer to it as a question of privilege."

But the young member for Quebec County got no further with his grievance. Mr. Speaker ruled that the matter was not a question of privilege, as it did not refer especially to the hon. member himself.

UNITED DANISH EMPIRE.

Iceland and Denmark to Link Their Futures.

COPENHAGEN, May 14.—The committee having the matter in hand to-day presented to King Frederick a report containing its recommendations for the regulation of the future relations between Denmark and Iceland.

The committee is composed of members of the Danish and Icelandic parliaments, and it was appointed at the time of his majesty's visit to Iceland last year. The report is accompanied by a draft of the new law to govern these relations. The bill to bring this law into being, which must be approved by both parliaments, constitutes Iceland a free, autonomous and independent country united to Denmark by a common king and common interests, and forming with Denmark a state federation—the United Danish Empire.

If the bill passes King Frederick will be entitled to call himself King of Denmark and King of Iceland. Various concessions have been granted to Iceland, giving a greater degree of independence. The Icelandic treasury will contribute to the Danish and Icelandic islands and Danes shall enjoy equal rights in both countries.

It is provided also that the law may be revised after twenty-five years and the union partially denounced should it be impossible to reach an agreement by both parliaments. The arrangement providing for a common kingship, a common ministry of foreign affairs and a common system of defence cannot be denounced.

NEW YORK, May 14.—Tammany is to leave its historic home on East 14th-street, and move uptown.

MINNESOTA FOR JOHNSON.

Democrats There Won't Even Have Bryan as Second Choice.

ST. PAUL, Minn., May 14.—The Democratic convention to-day formally endorsed John A. Johnson as a presidential candidate and at the same time by a vote of 72 to 16 refused to decide in favor of William Jennings Bryan as a second choice.

The Johnson men declared in their platform that while they entertained "an affection for and confidence in the integrity and ability of William J. Bryan, they believed that Johnson was a man better calculated to bring success to the Democratic Party and was first entitled to the support of Minnesota."
