

COBALT---Nova Scotia vein said to be Second Only to Lawson---COBALT

Nipissing and Nova Scotia Are Leaders in Day's Advances

Trading Confined to a Few Stocks—New High Prices Made in La Rose, Nip, Otisse and Scotia.

World Office, Friday Evening, July 9. An upward movement in Nipissing and Nova Scotia was the feature of the local mining exchanges to-day. Considerable liquidation in Nipissing has taken place of late and the shares sold down in ten dollars in consequence, but a sharp rally was experienced to-day, the shares selling up to \$2.80. It is reported that considerable buying is coming from New York at which point the stock is largely held. The highest price reached was \$11.00 on the New York curb.

Nova Scotia displayed considerable strength again to-day. The stock opened at 55 1/2, a point and sold up to above last night's close, and in the afternoon an advance of 30 points in a little over a week. The news from the camp regarding the recent strike is largely enthusiastic that of the last more enthusiastic than that of the last 60 days, and a still higher figure for the shares is talked of on the street. La Rose was higher, selling up to \$2.35, a new high price, with little of the stock coming out. Crown Reserve was moderately active and weak on the news of a threatened law suit. Trethewey was firmer and sold up to \$1.25.

The lower priced shares were generally listless. Temiskaming was quiet and closed at 23 1/4, after selling down to 23 1/2. The other Cobalts were inactive and unchanged, with Otisse fractionally higher, selling at the close at 41 1/4.

On the whole the market was dull, such transactions as occurred being confined to a few issues, and with the bulk of trading coming from professional investors.

NEWS IS FAVORABLE And Public Should Be Aroused From Apathy Soon.

Heron & Co. in their weekly letter say trading in Cobalt stocks was again on a large scale the mainly professional during the past week. Price movements were highly irregular, but with a tendency towards firmness and improvement towards the close. The news of the week was of the most favorable kind and prospects of the whole are exceptionally bright, yet sentiment is much mixed. The numerous favorable factors must surely arouse the public from its apathy soon however.

NEW YORK BUYS OTISSE RAPID ADVANCE IN SIGHT

"Pool" is Steadily Purchasing in Belief of Rich Strikes Soon to Be Made.

It has been quite the fashion recently to sell Nova Scotia-Cobalt short, and by the end of last week a very large short interest had accumulated in it. The news of the big strike, which is described by Manager Bilsky as second only to the vein on the Lawson, has put the shorts in a very uncomfortable position, and there is every prospect that they will be made more uncomfortable as the big vein on Scotia is opened up. It is now uncovered to a distance of 92 feet.

Another stock in which a large short interest has accumulated is Otisse, which began to advance about two weeks ago, and the bears have been selling it ever since. It is now estimated that there are fully 60,000 or 70,000 shares short and the New York pool is steadily buying to the limit.

NEWS FROM GOWGANDA BUBBLES WITH RICHNESS

REMARKABLE PROGRESS Is Being Shown Thru the Present Ore Shipments From Cobalt.

Thomas Nevins & Son in their weekly letter say: The remarkable progress that is being made in the development of the Cobalt silver camp in Canada, is concretely shown by the ore shipments during the week ending July 5.

The total shipments for the week amounted to 102,632 tons, while the aggregate of the claims not yet shipped for the month was 237,632 tons, which shows an average value per ton of the ore shipped during the week was only \$500, as compared with \$1,000 for the month of June. Assuming that the average value per ton of the ore shipped during the week was only \$500, as compared with \$1,000 for the month of June, the total value of the week's shipments amounted to \$51,316,000, which is at the rate of \$513,160 per ton, or about 71 per cent. of the total year.

The mines from the Kerr Lake section of the camp appear prominently among these shipments. The district is now the centre of the greatest new development work in the camp, the big mines in this respect being the Crown Reserve, Kerr Lake, Lawson and Cobalt Central. In the latter mine several rich discoveries have been made during the month, which have greatly increased its ore reserves, now estimated by engineers to be sufficient to keep the big concentrator running at full capacity for five years.


