A Truss TO WIDEN ST. CLAIR AVE.

City Will Not Bear More Than 25 Per Cent. of Burden-Overdraft of \$12,000.

The widening of St. Clair-avenue from Yonge-street to Bathurst so as to create a splendid thorofare 100 feet wide, at an estimated cost of \$170,000, was yesteriay approved by the civic works committee, who authorized the city engineer and assessment commissioner to prepare a formal bylaw for submission to the city council on Dec.

These officials, in reporting strongly in favor of the improvement, suggested that the city at large should contribute, but that its share should not exceed 25 per cent. of the total cost. The property owners affected have declared themselves of opinion that a large portion of the expense should be shouldered by the city, and it looks as tho there may be trouble ahead. Whole Plan Too Costly,

After referring to the fact that they had been asked to report on the widening of St. Clair-avenue from the ter-minus east of Yonge-street to Ossington-ave., the officials give the opinion that the portion east of Yonge-street should not be widened for the present because of the great expense thru the construction of many houses on the street line, and also that portion west of Bathurst-street for the same rea-

In recommending the widening to 100 feet of the section from Yonge to Bathurst-street, the report says the property flanking the road is more valuable than that to the west and east and the demand greater. To lessen the cost, the officials "followed the line of least resistance," a policy which they thought would be approved by the property owners. The work between Yonge and Bathurst-streets, including land damages and filling, to overcome the low grade between Bathurst-street and Kendal-avenue, should not cost than \$170,000.


