

HUGE CRANE UPSET, KILLS MAN

Fatal Accident at Niagara Falls-Second Workman Injured.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Jan. 12.-(Special.)-From the effects of scalds and shock received in an accident this afternoon at the Ontario Power Co.'s works, George Armstrong, aged 55, a carpenter, died at the general hospital at 4 o'clock, and Paul Summerfield is badly injured, but will recover. Both men belong to this city.

The Ontario Power Co. is putting a new pipe line thru the Queen Victoria Park. Summerfield was operating the 100-ton crane on the excavating work when it overturned, and toppled into the excavation made for the pipe line. Summerfield had applied the brakes to bring the crane to a stop, when the boom swung free and overbalanced the big machine, which fell 12 feet into the pit, turning over in the fall. Both men fell into the pit. Armstrong was pin-ned under the crane and escaping steam enveloped him. Summerfield was quick-ly released, but it was 45 minutes before Armstrong was set free, after hard
