Baron Dairoku Kikuchi Will Be a Guest of the University To-merrow-A Prominent Educationist.

The baron was born in 1855, and he was educated in England at the University College School, London, 1867-572, and afterwards at St. John's Colege, Cambridge, till 1877, when he was one of the wranglers.

He became professor of mathematics at the Imperial University, Tokio, and filled the chair from 1877 till 1898. He was also dean of the college of sciences at Tokio from 1881 till 1893, and president of the college from 1898 till 1901. From 1901 till 1903, he was minister of education, and in 1908, became president of the Imperial University of

In 1890, he was admitted a member of the house of peers. He is a member of numerous academies and learned bodies, and has published many text books on mathematical subjects, and on other educational and scientific ques-

He lectured on Japanese education before the University of London in 1907. his lecture in New York recently was on "The New Japan; Its Intellectual and Moral Development." His address on Friday will propably deal with this theme. He talks English fluently and is a brilliant speaker.

BERLIN, March 15 .- A wireless pocket telegraph apparatus was exhibited by the inventor, Prof. Cerebotani, the priest in charge of Munich parish, during a scientific lec ture before an audience of persons en gaged in the various oranches of scientific investigation, last night.

The instrument consists of a wooden base with the letters of the alphabet thereupon arranged in a circle. A small metal indicator swings on pivot in the centre, so adjusted as to respond to the wireless dot and dash currents and spell out the message The apparatus is very simple. It is somewhat larger than the ordinary

Prof. Cerebotani declared that a French journalist \_\_\_ attributed to him erroneously the invention of a wireless pocket telegraph instrument some time ago. He wrote to the journalist denying the invention. However, his letter was not pub-

lished, and accordingly nothing remained for him in the way of vindication except to invent the apparatus described, which he proceeded to do.
