MUST ISSUE PERMIT
But City Has Right to Impose Restrictions in Use of Building.

The action brought by Mary and Henry Lane against Robert McCallum, city architect, to compel the latter to issue a building permit for a rooming house on Inglewood-avenue, Centre Island, was heard by Justice Riddell yesterday.

Counsel for the Lanes pointed out that there were many rooming houses on the island and also that since the first application for a rooming house had been made, permission had been granted for the right to make additions to a residence, but, so far, neither a reply nor a permit had been received. After counsel for the city had objected that the first two applications were nullified on technical points, Justice Riddell found that the city had a right to impose restrictions in the use of buildings to be erected. But he also found that the plaintiff was entitled to put up her house, and that the city was not entitled to set up its judgment as an excuse should be sued for using it as a rooming house.

MORE ROOM NEEDED
For City Detective Department in the Municipal Buildings.

After a long, long sleep, the police commissioners yesterday awoke to a semblance of action with regard to the necessity of providing additional room for the detective department in the municipal buildings. The board heard Chas. Lennox, architect, and Property Commissioner Harris. They declared unanimously for the plan proposed by the architect, which is to cut over the north entry arch and provide room above that and also to enter two rooms unused on the west side of the arch. Mr. Lennox produced plans to show that this could be safely and inexpensively done, and that ample room would then be available. Commissioner Harris objected, but did not explain his objection. The matter will be passed on to council.

The present accommodation for the detectives is cramping the business of the department and is further a menace to the health of the men who are compelled to work without adequate light or ventilation.

REFORMING THE PARTY
Kingston Standard's Opinion of Three Present Members.

KINGSTON, April 12.—(Special.)—The Standard (Cont.) in its second article on the Ottawa situation says that it is assured that George Taylor, the chief Conservative whip, will retire from office, a course he wished to take a year ago.

Of Hon. G. E. Foster the article says: "After years spent in the service of the people he is actually worse off than when, ambitious and alert and buoyant, he began the battle for them for honest and progressive government."

But the Mr. Foster answer in this manner, the public attitude toward him is clearly not friendly at the moment, and is regrettable. It may be, it is likely to continue to be anything but friendly so long as he is in the political and public limelight. The conclusion is that if Mr. Foster remains in the party in his semi-official position as first lieutenant to Mr. Borden, the party will be unjustly suffer by reason of his presence. It is because of the public sentiment against him as his friends believe Mr. Foster himself has unjustly suffered.

AWAITS RESULT OF APPEAL
Wilkinson Ore Case Traversed Until Barber Case is Settled.

Despite the protests of defence counsel, W. E. R. P. K.C., the case of J. E. Wilkinson, charged with buying Cobalt ore from people unauthorized to sell it, was yesterday traversed by Judge Winchester until April 27.

The case was scheduled to come before Judge Denton, but the latter preferred not to sit on it for personal reasons and because the case of one Barber, for selling ore without authority, was still to be decided before the court of appeal, so Judge Winchester took it up.

"If the court of appeal decides that in the Barber case it did not constitute a legal sale, I will decide whether this case is relevant or not," said the judge.

Notwithstanding the defeat at the last municipal elections of the Bloor-street viaduct over Rosedale Ravine, to connect Danforth-avenue, the district around Danforth and Broadview-avenue is growing rapidly. A group of fine up-to-date stores has already gathered at the intersection, and seven new stores are now under construction on the south side of Danforth-avenue, immediately around the corner. Three stores are being built by J. D. Young (two 18 and one 20 feet frontage), to cost \$15,000, and four by the Playfair estate, at an outlay of \$25,000. The streets running eastward from Broadview-avenue and lying north of Carlton-street, to the city limits, are filled with a splendid class of residences.
