

## DR. CODY RECEIVES HONORARY DEGREE

Wycliffe College Makes Rector of St. Paul's a Doctor of Divinity.

Dr. H. J. Cody, rector of St. Paul's Anglican Church, was last night the recipient of the highest honor conferred by Wycliffe College, namely, the honorary degree of doctor of divinity. The introductory remarks were made by Rev. Thomas R. O'Meara, principal of the college, who paid many glowing verbal tributes to the work of the former minister of education, and to the degree of doctor of divinity conferred on Dr. Cody's work in connection with his government work, his success as rector of St. Paul's, and his achievements as a scholar and a professor at Wycliffe. Dr. N. W. Hoyle, president of the college, pronounced the presentation sentence, "By authority of this council, I confer on you the degree of doctor of divinity, honoris causa."

Right Rev. V. C. White, bishop of Hamilton, was also given a degree similar to that conferred on Dr. Cody. Rev. Mr. White has spent a lifetime in the work in China, and has been particularly prominent in the anti-opium movement, and in the work to combat leprosy.

"Dr. Cody's work was always raised on behalf of national idealism," said Rev. Canon O'Meara. "We are all proud of the service rendered to the province by Dr. Cody, and his education. In spite of the brevity of his term, he performed an immortal work."

During Dr. Cody's work in connection with the synod, Mr. O'Meara mentioned valuable services in the construction of the present Anglican book house, the building of the new church of St. Paul's, and the work of his clerical work and of his record at Wycliffe, where "he left an indelible mark on the minds of the graduates."

Dr. Cody said that it was with a peculiar sense of satisfaction that he was permitted to take the place of an honored graduate of the college. It is a stimulus to try to serve better in the future than in the past.

Becoming rector of St. Paul's, Dr. Cody told of past experiences, of his work in college, church and government, and of the men with whom he has come in contact during the last thirty years of his life. He mentioned many names of men who have been his colleagues, and who have been his friends, and who have been his teachers.

## SPANISH RIVER CO. REPORT INACCURATE

Underestimated Quantity of Timber on Crown Lands by About Fifty Per Cent.

William J. Bell of the Spanish River Lumber Company was examined yesterday by Crown Attorney R. T. Harding before Commissioners Riddell and Latchford, in connection with alleged discrepancies in the company's and the government report as to the quantity of lumber within the crown limits of Ontario. The result of the investigation so far "shows that the company underestimated the number of feet of timber by 50 per cent. in proportion to the government estimate. Technical evidence was taken concerning the methods of measurement employed and the quantity of lumber deducted to cover wastage. The honesty and accuracy with which the company's employees make their report was also under question, whereupon Justice Latchford remarked that "if such a foreman and lumbermen are dishonest, the public have no protection."

## Figures Given.

Examination by Mr. Harding brought out the following figures: In 1913-14 a report to the government showed a cut of 87,912,224 feet. The records of the company at the various mills show a cut of 30,113,973. The previous year 10,969,026 feet were reported to the government. The mill records show a cut of 24,337,620 feet. In the year 1916-17, a total of only 27,848,334 feet were reported to the government, while the mill records showed a total cut of 60,747,891 feet.

## COST TO PROVINCE OF SUPERANNUATION

Details Given of Premier Drury's Bill Concerning Civil Servants.

The cost to the province for the first year, under the civil servants' superannuation bill, introduced by Premier Drury, is estimated at \$12,000,000. The bill provides for the superannuation of civil servants who have served for 20 years, and for persons with ten years service, who are retired, and are not assignable to other work. The funds are to be contributed from the salaries of the civil servants and from the government treasury.

Every male employee must have his life insured for at least \$5000 or the board will insure him and deduct the premiums from his salary. The personal representatives of an employee who dies after ten years' service, or if the sum he has contributed to the fund, will be paid to him. The bill provides for the superannuation of civil servants who have served for 20 years, and for persons with ten years service, who are retired, and are not assignable to other work. The funds are to be contributed from the salaries of the civil servants and from the government treasury.

When an employee dies with less than ten years' service, the amount to be paid will be the sum paid by him to the fund, plus five per cent. interest. The maximum amount payable is \$2000, and will be paid in monthly instalments, and be exempt from garnishment, judgment, and seizure, and is not assignable. A public superannuation board will determine when an employee is eligible for retirement, and the board will be composed of the provincial civil service commission, a representative of the employees' association, and one member of each recognized party in the legislature. Widows and children will be entitled to a pension, and are not to be eligible for mothers' pensions or other allowances from the province.

The percentage to be deducted from employees' salaries, as contributions to the fund, are fixed according to the age of the employee, and range from 2 per cent. to 9 per cent. The act comes into force on June 15 next.

Warsaw, April 27.—Newspaper descriptions received here report that the Poles, advancing in Podolia, already have captured Zmerynka, an important railroad point, and Winnica, capital of the Bolshheviks. The Bolshheviks are crossing the Bug River at various points, retreating in confusion, the despatches say.

## Iceland Asks Membership In the League of Nations

Washington, April 27.—The Independent state of Iceland has applied for membership in the League of Nations. Other applications to be heard at the Rome meeting of the council of the league are from the republics of Georgia, San Marino, and Luxembourg.

## Arrest of Saragossa Radicals Leads to a General Strike

Saragossa, Spain, April 27.—A general strike has been declared here following the arrest of 15 members of the local radical committee who are said to be responsible for recent bomb outrages. The streets are being patrolled by the authorities.

## COL. H. C. BICKFORD ABOUT TO RETIRE

General Staff Officer, Toronto District, to Return to Civilian Life.

Ottawa, April 27.—It was announced at military headquarters today that Col. H. C. Bickford, C.M.G., general staff officer, Military District No. 2, Toronto, is about to retire, owing to pressure of private business affairs, and return to civilian life. Col. Bickford graduated from the Canadian militia to the 6th Dragoon Guards (Carabiniers) Imperial Army, and served for a considerable number of years in Great Britain. He was awarded the Queen's and King's medals, mentioned in despatches, and the Royal Humane Society's medal for saving life. On the outbreak of the great war he volunteered for services overseas, and was assigned to duty as general staff officer, Military District No. 2, subsequently he did proceed to France for a short period, but was called back to Canada for duty.

## Trained Many Troops.

In 1915 he was appointed to the permanent staff, Military District No. 2, with headquarters in Toronto, which furnished nearly one-quarter of the entire Canadian expeditionary force, and in 1916 had some 48,000 troops under training at one time at Camp Borden and Niagara. For the training of these troops Col. Bickford was principally responsible, and he carried out his duties with marked success. In 1918 he was appointed to command the infantry brigade of the Canadian expeditionary force (Siberia), with the rank of brigadier-general.

## LABOR LEGISLATION CALLS FOR CAUTION

Hon. G. D. Robertson Points Out Difficulties Which Confront Administration.

## STATUS OF POLICEMEN

They Are Not to Be Classed as Employees of Public Utility.

Ottawa, April 27.—(Canadian Press.)—Discussion of the industrial disputes act was proceeded with when the royal commission on unfication of labor laws met today. Addresses on the subject were made by Hon. G. D. Robertson, minister of labor, and P. A. Acland, deputy minister of labor. Hon. Mr. Robertson took occasion to say that he and the department of labor were honestly anxious to make progress on the issue of industrial disputes legislation. No government, however, would attempt to enact labor legislation until it had been carefully thought out, and that the government was anxious to be affected by it had been made known. That was the object of such meetings as the present one.

## Industrial Council Established.

If labor legislation sought by labor men could be whipped into shape and made reasonably acceptable to other parties interested, said the minister of labor, the government was prepared to save time.
