## M'LEAN'S ANSWER

NOT SATISFACTORY

Veterans Think Insult to Soldiers' Wives Should Be Publicly Retracted.

Officials of returned soldiers' organizations do not seem to be pacified by Brig.-Gen. McLean's explanation

of his alleged insult to "private" wives. It was understood that Gen. McLean, of the pensions committee, had made a statement to the effect that most soldiers had married women of the servant class and that such women should not be encouraged in idleness by having their pensions increased.

Gen. McLean now states that he was misunderstood, and that the official stenographer, reports read: "Most of the private soldiers who married servant girls were in demand as an unfit person to deal with pension matters appertaining to the rank and file."

Provincial Organizer Fred Marsh, of the G.A.U.V., does not accept that explanation and insists that the general's statement is an abominable insult which should be publicly retracted.

J. V. Conroy, of the G.W.V.A., felt in elined to close the incident with the general's apology, although another official of the same association de-

clared that Gen. McLean has not explained at all.

At the meeting of the Dominion executive of the G.A.U.V. last night the two following resolutions were carried: "Resolved that this executive

strongly condemn the attitude of Brig.-General H. H. McLean in reference to his statement that the majority of the wives of the rank and file were servants, and demand that he publicly retract his statement, and be it further resolved that we call for his resignation from the pensions committee as an unfit person to deal with pension matters appertaining to the rank and file."

It was further decided that the support of the G.A.U.V. would be given to the patients in Euclid Hall from Toronto. Copies of the two above resolutions will be sent to the press, Mr. McLean of the G.W.V.A. and to the general himself.

WILL STAY IN TORONTO

Seventeen Hundred Soldiers Being Treated for Tuberculosis

Ottawa, May 5.—(By The Canadian Press).—There are 1,715 returned soldiers under treatment for tuberculosis in sanatoria throughout the different provinces of the Dominion, according to an answer given in the house today. Of these 15 per cent. are considered incurable. The total number of ex-soldiers treated in sanatoria in each province is as follows:

Ontario, 3,404; Quebec, 1,350; Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia, 1,126; Manitoba, 687; Saskatchewan, 145; Alberta, 276; British Columbia, 735; New Brunswick, 272.

Ottawa Committee May Hear Re-establishment Evidence Today

Ottawa, May 5.—(By Canadian Press).—The hope was expressed today by the chairman of the special committee on pensions and re-establishment, that it would be possible for the committee to begin hearing evidence on the latter phase of its problem at some time tomorrow. Good progress has been made in the deliberative sessions on pensions matters, and it is hoped to at once proceed with re-establishment an secure all data on that end of the inquiry.

Prince Albert War Veterans Score Heavy Indemnities

Prince Albert, Sask., May 5.—The Prince Albert command of the Great War Veterans went on the warpath last night against the proposed increase of seasonal indemnities at Ottawa. It was pointed out that while there were soldiers' widows and children trying to live on inadequate pensions, and acute shortage of houses the increased indemnity could waste, especially as most of the members had other sources of income. It was said that it ill-befitted the members to preach economy on reconstruction and then ask an expenditure in their own favor, running into half a million dollars a year, a resolution was forwarded to the government and Dominion command.

CHARGED WITH THEFT.

Edward McGuire, Jones avenue, was arrested last night by the C.P.R. police, charged with theft. McGuire is said to have stolen a quantity of objects from the railway.

## GEN. HUGH M'LEAN

CENTRE OF STORM

Many Telegrams, Expressing Surprise and Indignation, Received at Ottawa.

Ottawa, May 5.—Telegrams from branches of the G.W.V.A. in all parts of the Dominion were received today by C. Grant MacNeill, Dominion secretary, protesting against the statement alleged to have been made by Brig.-Gen. Hugh McLean before the parliamentary committee on pensions, on the subject of the wives of private soldiers.

A resolution embodied in one telegram from Victoria, B. C., demanded the resignation from the committee of Brig.-Gen. McLean. Other wires inquire if the report of his statement is correct. All express surprise and indignation at such an utterance and demand that some definite action be taken by the Dominion executive of the G.W.V.A. to repudiate it.

Payments to C.E.F. Men Converted to Canadian Coin

Ottawa, May 4.—(By The Canadian Press).—In answer to a question by Mr. Joseph Archambault (Chambly-Verchères) in the house last afternoon, the government stated that all payments in sterling to members of the overseas military forces during the years 1914, 1915, 1916, 1917, 1918 and 1919 were converted to Canadian currency at the par rate of exchange. All payments to members of the C.E.F. overseas were made in money at the credit of the Dominion government in the Bank of Montreal, London. No payments were made to the Dominion government by reason of exchange. Balance of pay and allowances held in England by Canadian soldiers were converted into Canadian money at the par rate of exchange, on the return of these soldiers to Canada.

SIMPLEX OF SWINDLES PLAYED ON MERCHANTS

Several wholesale merchants have cause to remember a certain smooth-talking, well-dressed man who swindled them out of some thousands of dollars in broad daylight.

Representing himself as an agent for a well-known Toronto retail firm, the stranger called at Hayes & Lally's, Wellington street silk merchants. After looking over samples he ordered goods valued at about \$1800.

Asking the wholesale dealer to have the goods charged up to the firm, he had them placed in his automobile, which he is said to have successfully worked the same scheme on a Bay street wholesale cloth and woolen goods firm.

When the wholesalers sent in their bills, the companies whose addresses had been given disclaimed all knowledge of the purchases and stated that they had no such man in their employ.
