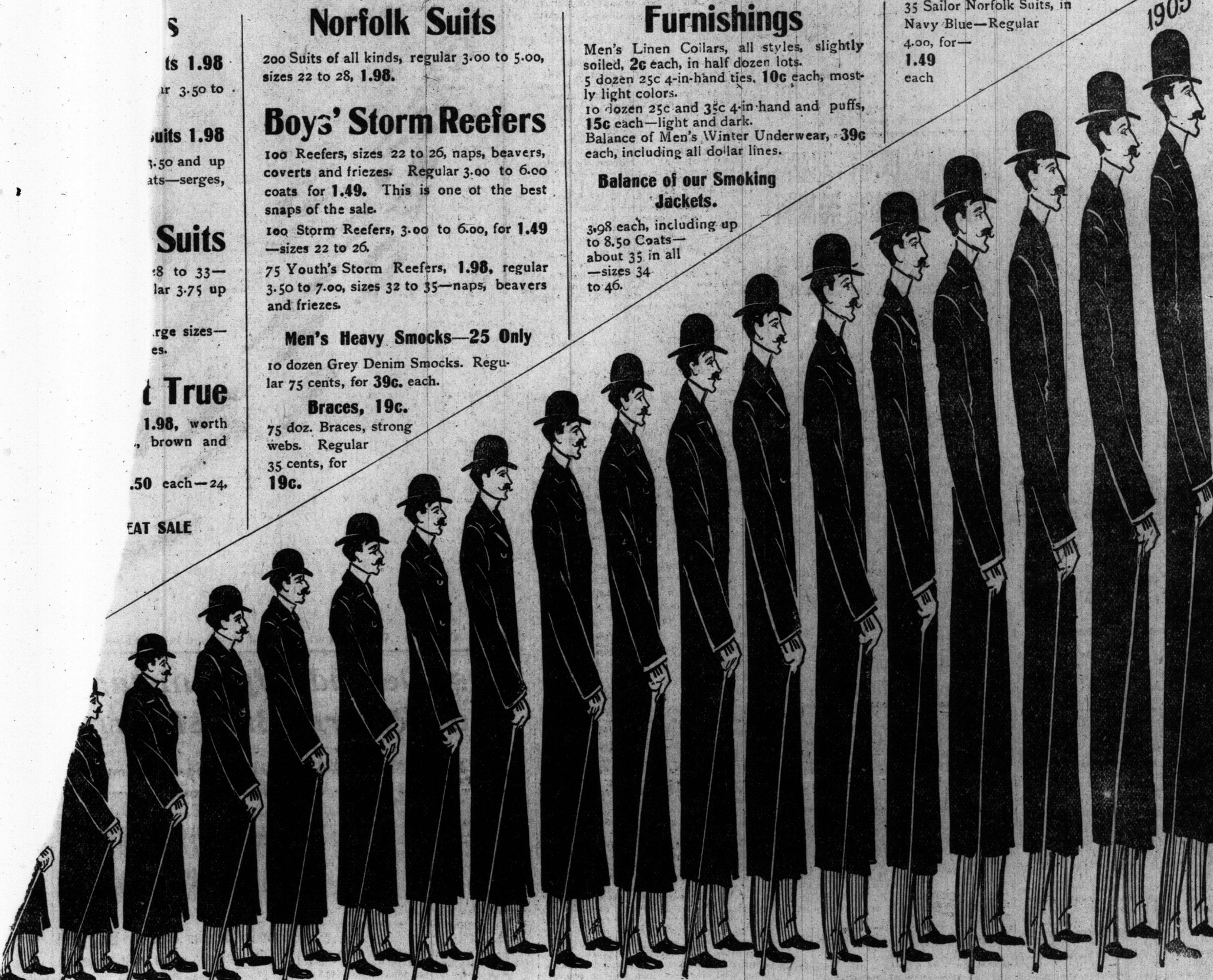

Halifax, Herald of Tuesday: Mr. den was seen yesterday by a reporter and asked regarding the letter which the despatches announced he had written to G. The letter, he said, would likely be read at the Conservative caucus in Ottawa to-day, but he did not know, even after that meeting, that it would be given out for publication. Registrations in Stratford totalled only \$3, or 20c less than the registrations for the Dominion election. The voters list was, however, thoroughly revised in December when several hundred names were added.

Conservatives claim to have made big gains on the Brantford registration. The number of names put on was 1384, compared with 1504 for the Dominion election.

Lindsay, Jan. 12.—(Special).—The report sent to The World that John A. Macdonald, Liberal candidate in East Victoria, would retire, was circulated by John Howie of Fenelon Falls, a prominent Liberal, and was his modified version of a statement made to him by Mr. Austin that if his arm, which was all right, did not get better right away, he would retire. Mr. Austin will stay in the field.

Kingston, Jan. 12.—(Special).—The political pot here will be boiling merrily by Saturday night, when a double-batch in the line of meetings will be held. E. F. Clarke, M.P., and J. J. Fox, K.C., of Toronto, will address a mass meeting in the city hall in the interest of D. M. McIntyre, the Conservative candidate, and both candidates will appear before a gathering of Queen's students. The campaign has been rather quiet so far, and it is difficult to determine how it is going. The Liberal candidate was thought to be fairly sure a month ago, but the defeat of the Liberals at the municipal elections, in which fourteen Conservative aldermen were elected out of twenty-two on the council, was a serious setback. Then Mr. McIntyre's being a graduate of Queen's is helping him with the students. The two unknown quantities are what may be called the silent vote, that is, Liberals who are disgusted with Ross administration and the registered vote which is likely to reach 2000. On Monday afternoon Hon. G. F. Graham speaks here in the interests of the Liberal candidate for the county and again at Wolfe Island in the evening.
