Evidence Will Probably be Commenced Today in the Charge Against Thornton J. Hains of Being Accessory to Murder.

Flushing, N. Y., Dec. 15.—With six jurors in the jury box and counsel for both sides hopeful that the remaining jurors may be selected during the first session of court, the state's case against Thornton J. Hains, a writer now on trial as an accessory to his brother, Captain Peter Hains, jr., in the killing of William E. Annis, publisher, at the Bayview Yacht Club last summer, will in all likelihood be presented in court late today.

THE PLURALITY IN NEW YORK STATE

ROOSEVELT WILL BE "WELL HEeled"

Strenuous Teddy Will Carry Four Types of Rifles and 3,000 Cartridges to Africa.

Washington, Dec. 15.—It is stated that for his African trip President Roosevelt has ordered four different types of rifles. The first of these is the most powerful rifle made and is intended for the very largest types of African game, such as rhinoceros, hippopotami and elephants. It is also likely to be extremely useful when the President finds the looked-for crocodile of the Upper Nile. The rifle carries a 300-grain bullet, with smokeless powder, and has an energy of 3,000 foot pounds at the time of impact.
