Misses Lugin's Concert Last Evening a Decided Success



**THE PRESIDENT OF FRANCE**

M. Alexandre Ribot, the new premier of France, is a man of lofty stature, spare in figure, and yet of commanding and distinguished presence, conveying the impression of great culture and refinement. He is perhaps the most stately and decorative figure in French public life today, is a most accomplished musician, the author of several standard works on English jurisprudence and judicial institutions, is possessed of a most extensive knowledge of American and English literature, and has for the last twelve years been a member of the Academy of France.

M. Ribot may be described as the father of the Franco-Russian alliance. It was he who, as minister and premier from 1890 to 1893, despatched the French fleet on its memorable visit to Kronstadt, on which occasion the convention between the two countries was finally concluded and proclaimed to the world by Alexander III. He further cemented the bonds of union between the two nations when he returned to office as premier and as minister of finance in 1895.

Ribot is the only great French statesman of the present day who has an American wife. He has been happily married for more than two-score years to Miss Mary Burch of Chicago.

**FIFTH AVENUE EASTER PARADE NOT A DISPLAY**

Women Confronted With Gravity of War, Paid Little Attention to Clothes This Time

With the Stars and Stripes flying from the windows overhead, the Easter parade in Fifth avenue on Sunday was more of a demonstration of patriotism than a display of the latest and most brilliant achievements in wearing apparel. Every one seemed prosperous, but there was little of the usual emphasis on clothes. It was a day without much sunshine and a treacherous April wind chilled the enthusiasm of many young women who might have worn their latest hats and costumes under brighter weather conditions.

The crowds themselves coming out of the churches where the ministers had preached of the war and its consequences to the nation, manifested no disposition toward gaiety. Men and women felt that they were confronted with stern obligations which made the mere matter of clothes unimportant.

In general it was a parade without much color, except for the red, white and blue, which were conspicuous on the garments of men and women. Even the bouquets were of patriotic design, many having been made of red, white, and blue flowers. Sweet peas, roses and violets lent themselves easily to such arrangements and wherever they appeared they added a novel and charming touch to the modiste's art. Aside from these evidences of patriotism, however, there were in olive drab uniforms of officers who had already been called to the colors also brought the war into the foreground of attention.

From the dressmaker's point of view the parade seemed to indicate that standards in dress were fixed by individual taste rather than any prevailing style. Skirts were long and skirts were short; some of them decidedly short. Striking effects in shoes were very rare, most of them being black, white or brown in color to match the skirt and hose.

In the matter of hats the emphasis was entirely on the shape. Some took the form of a trench helmet, with a strap under the chin, and many turbans were in evidence.

**WOMAN'S SALARY \$12,000**

Miss Kathyrine M. Haun Handles Ten Million a Year

St. Louis, April 13.—Miss Kathyrine M. Haun, of Philadelphia, treasurer of E. F. Houghton & Company, and a delegate to the fifth annual convention of the Western Oil Jobbers' Association meeting here, is said to be the highest salaried woman in the financial circles of the east, if not in the entire United States. As treasurer of the Houghton Company she receives a salary of \$12,000 a year. Miss Haun handles and is responsible for ten million dollars a year.

She commands fifty-five employees and, in addition to her duties as treasurer and director of finance and accounting, she superintended the welfare service of the firm. Miss Haun represents the Houghton Company in all matters of finance and accounting. Indications that she is a veritable feminine master of finance are absent in Miss Haun. Her outstanding characteristics are modesty and a retiring disposition.

"Every young man who enters our employ," said Miss Haun, in relating her experience and success, "expects to get somewhere near the top. The average girl just wants a job."

"Women do not succeed in business as a rule because they have no ambition to do so. Most of them want their business to be a makeshift until they have an opportunity to marry."

"I believe in equal suffrage socially, economically, industrially, commercially, and politically, but I do not believe in women losing their womanliness in obtaining either votes or business success."

"Of course, I have had to make sacrifices. I like fun, parties and all that sort of thing, as any other normal woman, but no one is going to advance to a high position who has her mind upon social affairs."
