

SOLDIER'S TRIBUTE TO 26TH BATTALION

"There is no Stopping That Bunch When They Get Started," Says Pte. Tufts of the Pioneers

"Canada can well be proud of her sons in France," writes Pte. Frank A. Tufts, of No. 2 Canadian Pioneer Battalion, to his mother, Mrs. Benjamin Tufts, of 128 Acadia street. The letter is full of optimism and cheerfulness, and he says that the 26th Battalion stop at nothing, always taking what they set out to get. The letter is as follows:—

Dear Mother:—I was speaking to a number of St. John boys recently and they are all well. I do not know how the 26th made out in the recent big fighting, but I think their losses were light. There is no stopping that bunch when they get started. They have always got-

ten what they went after. The bombardment was terrible. The Prussian Guards seem to be more favored than the other units of the enemy, as they were all dressed in full uniform and much better dressed than the others. It was pitiful to see one little fellow with his leg shattered, laying on a German Bible. No doubt you have heard of the new kinds of armoured cars of the Allies. They are queer looking but they have the Huns guessing. One went through a village that the Germans were holding, and they started to throw bombs at it. They might just as well have kicked at it for all the harm they did with the bombs. Nothing stops it short of a brick wall, and it can blow it down and go on at that.

Canada can well be proud of her sons in France. Once again they have made a good big haul of prisoners since I started this letter.

A tablet and an enlarged photograph of John Travers Cornwell, a boy hero of the Julian battle, are to be placed in the ward of the Grimsby Hospital in which he died.

Province Loses More Brave Sons

Rudolph Wilson Killed in Action; Three More in Casualty List; St. John Makes Better Showing in Recruiting

Private Rudolph Wilson, of the machine gun section of the 48th Montreal Highlanders, has been killed in action. The sad news was received by his wife, Mrs. Wilson, of 207 Rockland road, in a letter written by the machine gun officer of the battalion.

The names of five New Brunswick men appear in the midnight casualty list. Killed in action, W. P. Bourne, Pettitodiac; died, Ernest Ingalls, Grand Harbor; died of wounds, Corporal L. L. Bell, Grand Falls; wounded, R. Anderson, Plaster Rock, and C. Parent, Lower Dunfries.

Sergeant W. C. Reicker, who during the summer was attached to Lt.-Colonel A. H. Powell's staff at Valenciennes, is to be transferred to the New Brunswick command, according to official advice.

Recruits. The total number of recruits secured in the province during the last week was seventy-seven; the total for the preceding week was eighty-six; the county totals for last week were as follows: St. John, forty-four; Charlotte, seven; Resignouche, six; Westmorland, four; Kings, three; Northumberland, three; York, three; Albert, two; Carleton, two; Victoria, one; Queens and Sunbury, one and Kent one.

A total of nine recruits were secured in the city yesterday. Five signed on in the afternoon as follows: William Brayley, Hampton, 280th; Frank Lenihan, Loch Lomond, 280th; P. C. McNeill, St. John, 280th; and James Maxwell, St. John, Royal Engineers.

Rev. Edwin Smith, R. N. V. R. pastor of Arundale Presbyterian church at Tilsonburg, Ontario, former minister at Chipman, N. B., has been made commander of H. M. M. L. No. 287, and is now at Portsmouth, where his ship is being outfitted for the sea. She carries 18-pounders and a quick firing gun. 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Day Devoted To Home Missions

Proceedings of the United Baptist Convention Yesterday Include Survey of Various Fields

The consideration of missionary affairs occupied the attention of the United Baptist convention of the maritime provinces for the greater part of the time yesterday.

At the afternoon session after the address by Dr. DeBilis, Rev. H. R. Boyer presented greetings from the Canadian Bible Society and Rev. J. H. A. Anderson from the Presbyterian churches of the city.

Rev. H. G. Mellick reported for the Board of Western Missions, to which the maritime provinces had contributed \$6,919.

Rev. E. Bosworth presented the report of the Grande Ligne missions, the total receipts for which had been \$89,406. The following committees were elected:

Committee of resolutions—Rev. A. S. Lewis, Rev. Z. L. Fash, Rev. W. Addison, Rev. L. A. Fenwick, J. P. Gordon. Member of the board of management the Baptist Young People's Union of America—Rev. J. E. Wilson to take the place of Dr. J. H. MacDonald.

J. Wesley Dimock, treasurer of denominational funds, presented his report. The total amount raised was \$76,066.71. This came from the following sources:

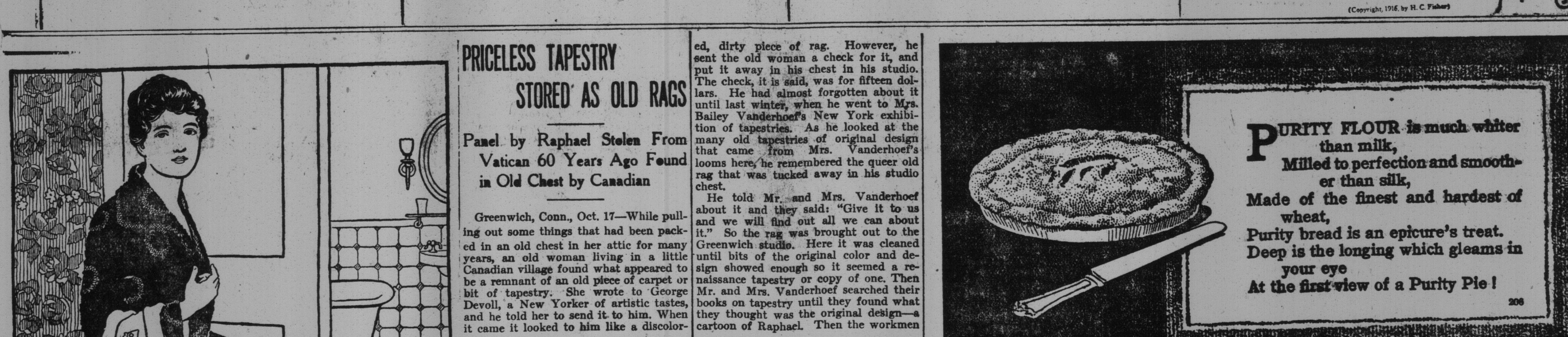
