

NO PEACE TILL OUR VICTORY COMPLETE, SAY THE RUSSIANS

Resolution at Duma Unanimous—The Munitions Situation

Petrograd, Aug. 3.—Michael V. Rodzanko Elakofskio today was re-elected president of the Russian Duma. The Duma placed itself by the unanimous adoption of a resolution declaring it to be the empire's unshakable determination not to conclude peace before Russian victory was complete, and pledging the willing assistance of the entire population for the creation of fresh means for continuing the struggle.

STRASSBURG TODAY BOMBARDED FROM AIR

Paris, Aug. 3.—A flotilla of Anglo-French aeroplanes today flew over the German city of Strassburg and dropped twenty-five bombs. The extent of the damage has not yet been ascertained. Strassburg is the capital of Alsace-Lorraine.

SOME 600 CANADIAN BANK OF COMMERCE MEN IN THE WAR

Upwards of 600 young men, members of the staff of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, are now on active service. In the casualty lists, names of members of the staff have been mentioned as follows:—Killed, 17; wounded, 29; missing, 4; prisoners of war, 31; from gas fumes and shrapnel.

On Wednesday afternoon at the home of Miss Margaret, the Patriotic League, the ladies of the Progressive League, and the ladies of the 6th Mounted Rifles, were given a talk by Mr. Phinney.

They are giving up just as much as you are, he said. Every man of the 750 now in the 40th Regiment has some woman he loves or who loves him.

"You are not doing your duty to your men to keep them away from the front," he said.

Harbor Revenue Gain

There is much cause for satisfaction in the showing of the harbor receipts for July, as compared with the corresponding period of last year. An increase of nearly \$2,000 is noted, giving an idea of the amount of business being handled about the wharves this summer, much of it being the long-expected and old-time "wind-jammers."

The harbor receipts for July, 1915, total \$1,818,475, while for the corresponding month last year they aggregated \$2,072,986, an increase of \$254,511.
