CONDITIONS FOR THE RIVER LUMBER DRIVE

Northern Waters Mostly Favorable For Getting Out the Cut—Prospects Poor in Lower Section

Throughout the lower province the lumber drives are held up on account of the low water in the streams, but in the upper portion of New Brunswick reports indicate that the drives are all running smoothly and the expectation is that the cut will be got out without difficulty.

Several prominent lumber merchants were interviewed this morning and it was learned from them that the streams in Maine, Quebec and the upper counties are running all right; it is feared that there may be a heavy loss to the lumbermen who cut in the lower counties unless the next week brings heavy rains.

F. C. Beatey of Stetson, Cutler & Co., said that the drives in the upper St. John are running freely but the success has not been so great on the Tobique and Miramichi. The best water of the Tobique is flowing strongly, he said, but the reports that are being received from the company's drives show that the water is abnormally low and unless atmospheric influences favor them, the lumbermen will have difficulty to release this winter's cut.

The majority of Murray & Gregory's drives are in Quebec. Mr. Gregory told the Times today that he had not received much word from them since the stream opened, but he believed that they were coming along all right.

John E. Moore reported that his drives were not running as well as was expected. The streams on which his drives are drifting are very low, in fact the water is below any precedent mark. He has had no report from them since the rains of this week began and, although they may ease the situation somewhat, he expects that it will require a great deal more before the cuts are brought safely to the mills.

NEW BRIDGE OPEN BY AUGUST 1

Messrs. McVey and Dominion Bridge Company to Complete Concrete Work—Removal of Old Structures

(Special to Times).

Frederick, April 29—Chief Engineer A. R. Wetmore of the public works department was in St. John today looking over the Suspension bridge work and making arrangements to carry it forward to completion as early as possible.

There is considerable concrete work to be done and the contractor who built the anchor piers, Messrs. McVey of St. Stephen, will look after that part of it. The work of this nature will be open for both the eastern and western approaches to the new bridge. The Dominion Bridge Company also is to put a concrete floor on the structure and it is estimated that if contractors get to work promptly, the bridge will be open for traffic about the first of August.

It will not be possible to make the approaches to the bridge at the start what they will be later when the old suspension structure is removed as well as the anchor piers, which are the huge cables. Until this is done some inconvenience may be experienced by the public but it will not be a matter of a short time to dismantle the old bridge and clear the way for the approaches to be placed on the new bridge. The rails for the street railway will also be put in position and no suspended tracks will be laid from each end of the bridge so that the through street car service may be begun as soon as possible.

It has been determined to begin the dismantling and tearing down of the old Suspension bridge just as soon as it is possible to cross the new structure. There are firms in the United States as well as in Canada who make a specialty of this sort of work and, as there will be two large bridges in New Brunswick to be removed at Grand Falls and at the St. John falls—no difficulty is anticipated in getting one of these firms to undertake the work. There should be considerable material in the structure that is of some value but whether there will be sufficient to defray the cost of removal remains to be seen.
