FEDERAL CANNING INSPECTOR HERE

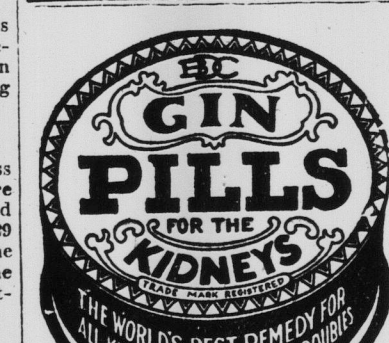
**C. S. McGillivray Explains Close

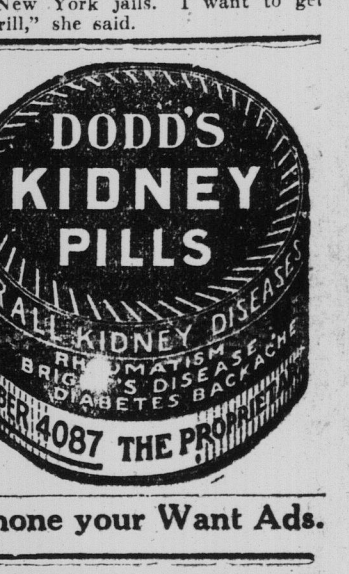
CIVIC GOVERNMENT SUBJECT OF DEBATE

sion Forms Compared by
St. Andrew's Y. P. S.**
