in the House this afternoon a copy of the Joint report of the International Boundary Commission upon the survey and demarcation of the boundary between Canada and the United States from the source of the St. Croix River to the St. Lawrence, the International boundary line between Canada and the United States, in the section referred to and as surveyed and marked by the International Boundary Commission acting under Article III. of the Treaty of April 11, 1908, between Great Britain and the United States, is a re-establishment of the boundary as described in Article I. of the Treaty of Aug. 9, 1842, commonly called the Webster-Ashburton Treaty and as laid down under Article VI. of that treaty of Commissioners Albert Smith and J. B. Bestcourt, whose final report bears the date of June 28, 1847.

This portion of the International boundary is 670 miles in length and lying between the provinces of New Brunswick and Quebec on one side and the State of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont and New York on the other, forms a part of the boundaries of those provinces and states.
