LINE BETWEEN N. B. AND MAINE IS CONFIRMED

Boundary Board Rules on
Limits Set By Ashbur-
ton Treaty

OTTAWA, Jan. 26.—Hon. Charles Stewart, Minister of the Interior, tabled in the House this afternoon a copy of the joint report of the International Boundary Commission upon the survey and demarcation of the boundary between Canada and the United States from the source of the St. Croix River to the mouth of the St. Francis River.

670 MILES OF BOUNDARY.

This portion of the International boundary is 670 miles in length and lying between the provinces of New Brunswick and Quebec on one side and the State of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont and New York on the other, forms a part of the boundaries of those provinces and states.

The lengths of these province or states boundaries thus formed are:

For convenience in describing the line, it was divided by the commission-ers acting under the treaty of 1842 into nine parts, each of which includes a

portion of the boundary, topographically distinct from the adjoining subdivisions. To each of these subdivisions an appropriate name was given, and these names appear on the official boundary maps of 1848-49 and have been used in treaties on the boundary.

SUB-DIVISIONS.

For this reason they have been retained in the report. The name and extent of each of these subdivisions is shown as follows:

1.—The north line, 77.6 miles, the approximately straight line nearly due north from the source of the St. Croix River to the Saint John River.
2.—The Saint John River, 72 miles, from its intersection with the north line to the mouth of the St. Francis River.
3.—The St. Francis River, 32.6 miles, from its mouth to the outlet of Lake Pohenagumook.

SOUTHWEST LINE.

4.—The southwest line, 64.2 miles, the straight line from Lake Pohenagumook to the northwest branch of the Saint John River, near English Lake.
5.—The south line, 18.5 miles, the straight line from the northwest branch of the Saint John River near English Lake to the southwest branch of the Saint John River.
6.—The southwest branch of the Saint John River, 38.4 miles, from the end of the south line and through Little Saint John Lake to Monument 318 and thence along the crest of the watershed that separates the waters flowing into tributaries of the St. Lawrence River from those flowing into the Penobscot, Kennebec and Rosecoggin, and Connecticut Rivers to Monument 307 at the source of Halls Stream.

HALLS STREAM.

8.—Halls Stream, 26.6 miles, from its source at the intersection of the Valen-tine and Collins, or West Line.
9.—The west line, 154.9 miles, the approximate forty-fifth parallel of latitude from Halls stream to the St. Lawrence River, including the Vermont Quebec and New York-Quebec lines.

The British members of the Boundary Commission are W. F. King and J. J. McArthur, and the United States members are O. H. Tittmann, E. C. Barnard and E. L. Jones. The report comprises two large volumes.

BRITAIN GIVES ITALY GOOD DEBT TERMS

Better Conditions Got by
Volpi in London Than
From U. S.

LONDON, Jan. 26.—Great Britain and Italy have come to a settlement on the Italian war debt. Complete agreement has been reached as evidenced by an official statement issued this evening, reading:

"Count Volpi, (Italian Minister of Finance) and Mr. Churchill, (Chan-

cellor of the Exchequer) have arrived at a complete agreement on the Italian debt to Great Britain. Formal signature of the funding agreement will take place tomorrow evening. As yet the exact terms of settlement are not known. It seems safe to assume, however, that the British taxpayer will be greatly disappointed, as it is understood, the terms of Count Volpi obtained were even better than the terms granted to Italy by the United States. It is believed that the main lines of the settlement provide for the payment of an annuity of £4,500,000 for 62 years, the annuities commencing forthwith, but possibly with some slight relaxation on the first year. Italy renounces the interest on £22,000,000 in gold deposited with the Bank of England. The Italian mission will leave for Rome Thursday, having been in London for two weeks.

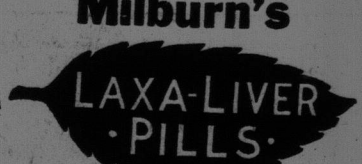

DIGBY ASKS D. A. R. FOR PROTECTION

Council Passes Resolution
Following Fatal Acci-
dent on Track

DIGBY, Jan. 26.—The town clerk was instructed last evening by the council to write George E. Graham, general manager of the Dominion Atlantic Railway, asking him to take immediate steps to provide important railway crossings in town with the necessary crossing alarms and to direct the trainman on the suburban to be constantly on duty when that train is crossing Prince William and Birch streets in order to safeguard the citizens.

The motion was moved by Council-
or Holdsworth, seconded by Council-
or Aymer and carried unanimously.
Town Clerk Boden brought to the
attention of the council the recent fatal
accident in Digby when Mrs. Sullivan
was struck by a D. A. R. train on the
main highway and died a few hours
later at the Digby General Hospital.

From information received, Mr. Boden
stated, neither the fireman nor the en-
gineer knew that they had struck the
woman until they were notified at An-
napolis.

Councillor Merkel stated that an-
other citizen in town had a narrow es-
cape from death on the day that Mrs.
Sullivan was fatally injured. A bell or
some other signal should be placed on
dangerous crossings.

LLOYD GEORGE RAPS MOND'S SECESSION

STATES LAND ISSUE
IS ONLY AN EXCUSE

Says He Would Have Sought
to Head Liberals; Bitter
in Statement

Canadian Press Despatch.

LONDON, Jan. 26.—Lloyd George makes bitter comment on the secession from the Liberal party of Sir Alfred Mond, M. P. Former Minister of Health, and Sir Alfred's going over to the Conservative party, because of Lloyd George's land campaign as announced last night.

"I am not in the least surprised,"

Lloyd George says with regard to Sir Alfred Mond's move. "He was obviously making tracks for the Tory party and the land question is only an excuse. His actions have nothing to do with the land question."

"He could have gone to the Liberal convention to present his case for the leadership of the party. If the decision had gone against him he could then have acted as he has done. The real reason for his present course is given in that part of his letter to Lord Oxford announcing his resignation in which he reveals his conviction that the Liberal party offers poor prospects for ambitious men."

"Like another notorious member of his race, he has gone to his own place."

GRAHAM EXPECTED TO GET SEAT SOON

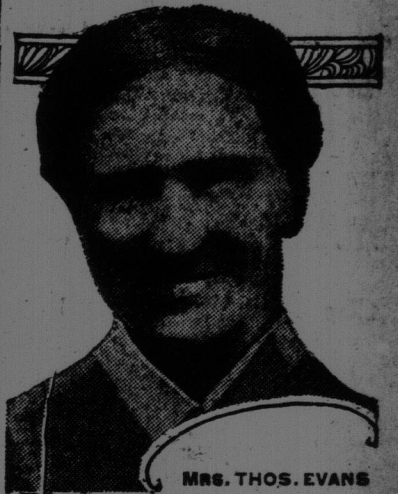
OTTAWA, Jan. 26.—Following the coming election of Premier King in Prince Albert by acclamation, it is probable that a seat will be opened for Rt. Hon. George P. Graham, Minister of Railways and Canals, and following him it is possible that a seat will be sought for Hon. Charles Dunning, Premier of Saskatchewan, who some time ago, it is understood, expressed his readiness to enter the Federal arena.

What other cabinet reorganization may be undertaken will be disclosed later when the Prime Minister returns to the House.
