Foster and Hayes and Others
Speak at County
Gatherings

Tariff, Courtenay Bay Work
and Other Matters of Cam-
paign Discussed.

Hon. Dr. W. E. Foster and R. T. Hayes, Liberal candidates for Saint John-Albert, addressed three meetings last night. They spoke first at the Liberal committee meeting in Milford, presided over by George Melanson. The secretary was Harry Berry. From Milford the candidates went on to Glen Falls and afterwards went to the meeting in Loch Lomond. At Loch Lomond Jeremiah Donovan was chairman.

Hon. Dr. Foster, in his speech, said that the Courtenay Bay work now being carried on was not a political dodge, but had been one of the conditions upon which he had accepted a portfolio in the King Government. He dealt with the question of employment looking forward to an expansion of trade through the opening of wider markets and the providing of better facilities to handle the trade. 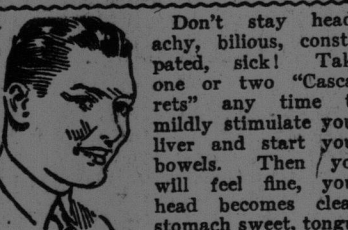
West Saint John terminals. Every provision would be made by the Liberal Government for extending trade through that area.

"Cat Eye Annie" Gets Ten Months Term

BUFFALO, Oct. 26.—"Cat-eye" Annie, known throughout the continent as a notorious confidence woman, has been recaptured after having broken from the Erie county jail. She was found in the attic of a partially constructed house in Kenmore, just outside the city limits, by a workman.

Under the name of Annie Archer, "Cat-eye" Annie was sentenced to 10 years in Auburn prison for the theft of jewelry worth \$75,000 from a Buffalo home where she was employed as a maid. She was arrested in Milwaukee recently where she was using the name Lillian McDowell. She was wanted for robberies in at least seven cities.

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32 TAKEN OFF SHIP DISABLED ON OCEAN

Seven Trans-Atlantic Liners De-
layed; Other Crafts Are
Damaged.

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—The rescue of 32 members of a disabled steamer, damages to other vessels and delays in the arrival of seven trans-Atlantic liners were among the consequences of the storm in the North Atlantic during the week-end.

Huge seas whipped by gales disabled the Norwegian steamer Elven,

bound from Rotterdam to Sydney, N. S., in mid-ocean and the steamship American Trader went to the rescue today. Captain Fish, of the latter vessel, found the Elven helpless, with its steering gear broken and its boats carried away.

The crew of the Elven was taken off and the American Trader continued towards this port.
