Yankees to Play Reds.

Besides the long series with the Brooklyn National League club, the Yankees will engage in another interleague clash during the coming spring training season. Arrangements have been made for a series of three games between the Huggins' force and the world's champion Cincinnati Reds, all of which are to be played in Florida.

The Yankees, who will train in Jacksonville, will make a trip to Miami, the training camp of the Reds, for games on Monday and Tuesday, March 15 and 16. The Reds will break camp at Miami after playing Washington on March 27, and will meet the Yankees at Jacksonville on Monday, March 29. The schedule of the Yankees-Reds series has not been announced, but it is planned to play seven or eight games in Jacksonville, five or six on the journey northward, and then three more at Ebbets Field on April 10, 11 and 12. The championship races in the two major leagues will be started on April 14.
