Stars Will Be Insured.

New York, Jan. 22.—Earl Caddock, the Iowa wrestler, is expected to arrive in this city this week and establish local headquarters where he will complete his training for his match against Joe Stecher, Nebraska scissor-hold expert, at Madison Square Garden on Jan. 30.

Caddock expects to do his training at Great Neck, L. I. He hired Jack Curley, promoter of the coming match, that he was leaving Chicago yesterday, and is accompanied by a retinue of training partners who will assist him in his work at Great Neck. Stecher, who has been delayed in his journey from Omaha, is also expected to arrive here today. The Nebraska probably will select a local gymnasium as his training quarters.
