FORT WILLIAM PLANT
(Canadian Finance)An agreement, signed by Stanley E. A-
kin, general manager of the Maritime Nail
Co., Ltd., of St. John, N. B., has been
secured by the Fort William Industrial
Bureau, whereby Mr. Ekin and associates
propose to establish in Fort William a plant
for the manufacture of wire nails and wire
goods. The plant will cost not less than
\$300,000, and give employment to 200 men
for 300 days in each year. The agreement
was presented and accepted by the city
