POOL ATTACK ON C.P.R. GROWS IN BREADTH

Competing Lines Develop New System of Onslaught—Attempt to Divert Travelers and Settlers

(N. Y. Journal of Commerce.) Berlin, Feb. 28.—The struggle between the North Atlantic shipping pool and the Canadian Pacific company is no longer to be carried on by reduction of rates alone. The Canadian company does not operate its ocean traffic lines mainly for profit from transportation, but as feeders for its railroad system and its colonies. This leads to a condition where reductions of rates may not meet the Canadian road as much as the real shipping companies, whose companies in the pool, therefore, have decided to go against the Canadian company with additional means which, under certain circumstances, might prove more efficient than reductions of rates. The pool companies some time ago decided not to have their Canadian terminals in St. John or in Halifax, where the Canadian railroad begins, but in Portland, where the Grand Trunk, the strongest competitor of the Canadian Pacific starts. The Canadian Pacific is intended to be hurt by this move in two respects, travelers are to be taken away from its railroad system and settlers from its lands. The attack by the pool companies are not only directed against the Canadian entrance gates to the Canadian railroad, but against Trieste, the new starting point and point of support which the Canadian railroad established to convey emigrants and colonists from the Eastern Mediterranean countries, Hungary and the Southern Slavish countries, to its ships, roads and territories. The Austrian line, the Austro-American, which declined the offer when the Canadian railroad intended to establish and operate the new emigrant line Trieste-Canada in common with the Austro-American, has now, after the outbreak of the light, established a direct competing line Trieste-Canada for the account of the pool and partly with ships and other pool lines. The Canadian shipping fight seems to be broader than had been expected at the start and the position of the road offers some dangerous openings for attack though it does not share in the Canadian shipping trade with as much tonnage and as modern and, therefore, expensive shipping material as the pool companies.
