SITUATION IN REAL ESTATE IN THIS CITY

Financial Post of Canada Gives Attention to Conditions in St. John

PRICES CONSIDERED LOW

The Big Expenditures at Courtenay Bay and West St. John and the Consequent Expansion—Something of the Values of Local Property

The prices of all kinds of real estate in St. John, compared with towns of the same or smaller population and far less prospect of becoming great cities, are low. While prices have appreciated considerably during the last six months, they are still far below the real value when the magnitude of the works in progress and the future prospects of the city are considered.

This is the unbiased opinion of the Financial Post of Canada, as expressed in an editorial review of the real estate investment situation throughout Canada. Coming from an impartial critic, and such as will inform one, his testimony should bear considerable weight with those who are seeking profitable investments.

The opinion is fairly general as shown by the experience of a local real estate man who has sold with a stranger from the west. The latter came into the real estate man's office and inquired regarding the properties he had on hand.

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ANOTHER REVOLUTION THREATENS TURKEY?

Rumor That Dardanelles Campaigning Was Inspired to Stave it Off

London, July 20.—The mystery surrounding the reported attack upon the Dardanelles by Italian torpedo boats and their repulse with the loss of two vessels and the damage of six others, coupled with the proclamation of the Sultan of Turkey exhorting the troops to remain loyal, suggests the possibility that another revolution is brewing in Constantinople.

The Italian government denies knowledge of an attack by its torpedo boats upon the Dardanelles. While independent dispatches confirm the fact that a cannon of some description took place, all the reports concerning an Italian attack and of the damage inflicted upon the Italian torpedo boats come from official Turkish sources and are not confirmed by press despatches.

EMPEROR OF JAPAN CRITICALLY ILL

Tokyo, July 20.—Emperor Meiji is suffering from affections of the stomach and brain. He was unconscious yesterday.

The emperor was born on November 3, 1867, in Kyoto and has reigned since 1867, when he succeeded his father, Kamei. He married, in 1889, a daughter of Prince Ichijo. The heir apparent to the Japanese throne is Prince Yoshihito, a son of the emperor, who was born on August 31, 1879.

THE CANADIAN VISITORS

Mr. Churchill Will Not Be Able to Announce Anything Definite From Canada on Navy—Hon. Mr. Doherty to Visit Ireland

(Canadian Press). London, July 20.—The last court function of the season took place last night when the king and queen gave a state ball at Buckingham Palace.

The Canadians were given places of honor in the state entry and procession and were seated on the dais to the right of the throne. They were given seats at the supper which followed the ball.

Frontier Doherty had a lengthy interview during the afternoon with the colonial secretary. He was especially interested in the views of the Canadian ministers and their views on the question of the contribution to the British navy.

The Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice and Miss Doherty have decided to visit Ireland before returning to Canada. They will go to Paris after the conclusion of the appeal relating to the Canadian marriage law which will open before the privy council on Monday next.

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
