GOVERNMENT WAS AGAINST THIS LOAN

Britain Thought it Unwise to Have Private Negotiations With

London, Sept. 25—A statement published here to the effect that nothing was said by the British government to the negotiators of the new Chinese loan in the nature of a prohibition of the loan is denied. It is learned that on the first intimation to the foreign office as to the negotiations bearing on this loan the promoters were informed that if they proceeded with it they would be acting in direct opposition to the wishes and policy of the government, which would be compelled to protest to the Chinese government against protest to the Chinese government against

the transaction.

A statement on this subject given out by the foreign office makes reference to the instructions which the government recently gave to the British minister at Peking. Sir John N. Jordan, to oppose the loan. The United States and Great Britain co-operated in this opposition, objection to the loan being based on the belief that foreign supervision was necessary over the expenditure of loans granted to China.
