Women to Go to Prison.

London, Oct. 23.—Seventeen of the women suffragists who were arrested Oct. 13 during the storming of the House of Commons on charges of disorderly conduct were yesterday sentenced in the Bow street Police Court to terms of imprisonment varying from three weeks to three months. The women were offered the alternative of giving bonds for their good behavior, but they elected to go to jail.

London, Oct. 23.—Alex. Acland Hood, Tory whip, has unsuccessfully endeavored to get Dr. William Osier to withdraw his candidature for the rectorship of Edinburgh University.

Renown Sails For Bermuda.

Halifax, Oct. 23.—H. M. S. Renown is to leave here Nov. 5 for Bermuda, and H. M. S. Brilliant is expected to arrive from Newfoundland Nov. 19, and will remain here a month.

Two Prospectors Disappear.

Vancouver, B.C., Oct. 21.—Harry Phipps and Mathew Tummon, Englishmen, left Edmonton March 28 for the Yukon river, gold placer diggers, well outfitted. They arrived at Fort Graham, Findlay river, June 4 and were last heard of in camp 60 miles north of Fort Graham. There the Indians noted their horses and empty camp, but thinking the men were prospecting and would return to the outfit, touched nothing, although they wondered that no provision was made to secure feed for the horses. Finally they reported to the Hudson Bay agent at Fort Graham. The men's fate is a mystery, but it is presumed they are drowned.

Col. Jeffrey Barland, who gave \$75,000 to found a tuberculosis hospital in Montreal, has purchased a large house in Belmont Park, for \$30,000, and the home will be started at once.

BLIZZARD IN WEST

All Trains Are Blocked by the Unexpected Downfall.

TERRIFIC STORM IS RAGING

Gale of Wind and Snow Has Completely Demoralized the Railroad Lines and Passenger Trains Are Stalled Unable to Move an Inch—Ten Inches Have Fallen and Drifts in the Cuts Are Deep.

Winnipeg, Man., Oct. 23.—One of the worst snowstorms that has ever occurred in the west has been at the height of its fury for many hours, and has completely demoralized the services of the C.P.R. and C.N.R. trains.

The storm started Tuesday night, and has continued with unabated vigor. Ten inches of snow has already fallen, and, accompanied by a terrific gale, snow has blown into the railway cuts, completely filling them up, and in many stretches the snow is over ten feet deep.

The C.P.R. have rushed snowplows to the scene, and are hard at work to clear the tracks, but very little progress can be made until the snow ceases to fall. As soon as a clearance is made the blizzard fills it up again.

The Atlantic Express from Vancouver and western points is completely stalled, and also the Imperial Limited from Vancouver. The westbound train of Wednesday is held up also, and none of them can proceed one inch.

No trains from the west reached the city yesterday, and it is doubtful when they will get through.

In the meantime the railway company is taking care of passengers, and are seeing that they were well looked after until able to proceed. The Winnipeg Express from Toronto was about two hours late in arriving yesterday morning. No. 1 westbound went out at 1.15 yesterday afternoon. The Pacific Express last night is scheduled on time. On other branches trains are running according to schedule.

"Cancelled, big snowstorm in the west," was the bulletin received at the Canadian Northern Railway office yesterday morning regarding No. 2 from Edmonton.

The storm, which broke over Alberta Tuesday night, was wholly unexpected by the railways, and no preparation was made to receive it. The storm was a blinding one, and the snow quite soft. It has not done so much damage on the open track, but has rested in the cuts of the railroads in a solid mass.

FOSTER MAKES REPLY.

Answers Grant Charge With Big Pre-Election Play.

Toronto, Oct. 23.—A writ claiming \$50,000 damages for slander against Rev. J. A. Macdonald, editor of The Globe, has been issued on behalf of Hon. G. E. Foster.

Formal notice that writ for libel will issue was served on The Globe yesterday. The writ will name \$100,000 as the amount claimed.

This is Hon. G. E. Foster's reply to Mr. Macdonald for having at Ottawa on Tuesday night used pretty strong language in referring to Mr. Foster's business relationship with the Union Trust Co. in the matter of commissions, and to The Globe for publishing the same.

Mr. Macdonald was not in the city yesterday, but the writ was placed in the sheriff's hands for service today. The writ was issued by Kingsmill, Hellmuth, Saunders & Torrance.

"The action is quite a personal matter and is entirely aside from politics," said Hon. Mr. Foster yesterday. "The same firm of solicitors is also enquiring into the printed matter which has been put into circulation by various printing companies, and if examination warrants and if the law allows it, these will be prosecuted to the extreme limit of the law for circulating libelous statements."

It is also contemplated to issue a writ against W. H. Shaw for damage for defamation of character in connection with the anonymous letter which Mr. Shaw then read, containing allegations against Mr. Foster which Mr. Pigott of Chatham and others interested have promptly denied.

Brockville, Oct. 23.—At last night's reception to Hon. G. R. Graham, Esq., J. A. Macdonald, editor of The Globe, said he had just been informed that Hon. G. E. Foster had entered an action against himself and The Globe for libel.

He then went on and repeated the charges again, and said he was prepared to prove them on the platform and in the courts.

Three weeks to pass without taking action respecting his fireworks for a few days before the election.

"I don't apologize," went on Mr. Macdonald. "I say I am ready to stand by every word I said, and every word I wrote. I will be prepared to meet Mr. Foster, if he ever does come into court." His remarks were received with great applause by the audience.

Madrid, Oct. 23.—King Alfonso and Queen Victoria, accompanied by Premier Maura, have started for Barcelona, where they will remain until Oct. 27.

All the anarchist centres are being closely watched.

The Daily Tenement Bomb.

New York, Oct. 23.—Another bomb was exploded Wednesday night in an east side tenement, which has been guarded by police for weeks to prevent just such outrages.

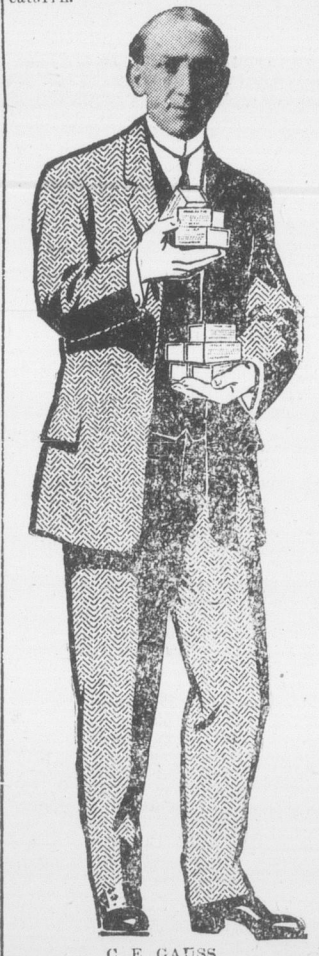
Chief Is Thrown Down.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Lesson V.—Fourth Quarter, For Nov. 1, 1908.

THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.

Text of the Lesson, II Sam. xv, 1-12. Memory Verses, 5, 6—Golden Text, Ex. xx, 12—Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

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It was a rare thing that the Lord was able to write of Abraham, "I know him, that he will command his children and his household after him, and they shall keep the way of the Lord" (Gen. xviii, 19). It is written of so good a man as Eli that his sons were sons of Belial. They made themselves vile, and he restrained them not, and the Lord looked upon that as honoring his sons above God. He did reason with his sons, but he did not command or restrain them (I Sam. ii, 12, 24, 29; iii, 13). David had one son, a fine looking fellow, whom he never even displeased by asking him, Why hast thou done so? (I Kings i, 5, 6). But he turned out very badly. He had a beautiful name, Adonijah, which means Jehovah is my Lord, but a beautiful name or form or features count it nothing if the heart is not right with God. Absalom's name signifies "father of peace," and there was not a more beautiful man in all Israel (II Sam. xiv, 25, 26), but we see him in today's lesson ready to dethrone and kill his own father.

Absalom, having slain his brother Amnon, fled to Talmai, king of Geshur, his mother's father, and was there three years (II Sam. xiii, 37, 38; iii, 3). But David longed to see him. Jonah, perceiving David's longing for Absalom, brought it about through a wise woman of Tekoa (chapter xiv), so Absalom returned to Jerusalem, and yet he was there two full years without seeing his father's face (xiv, 28). In due time Absalom and his father met. The king kissed him (verse 33). Then follows the lesson of today, wherein we see Absalom stealing the hearts of the men of Israel and under the pretense of keeping a vow to the Lord at Hebron caused himself to be proclaimed king, saying, "Absalom reigneth in Hebron" (verse 10). He sent for his father's counselor, Ahithophel, and took with him 200 men from Jerusalem, who went in their simplicity and knew not anything, and so the people increased continually with Absalom, and the conspiracy against David was strong (verses 11, 12).

God calls Israel His son, His first-born, and said of him, "Thy beauty was perfect through my comeliness, which I had put upon thee," and called him the dearly beloved of His soul and yet had to say, "I have nourished and brought up children, and they have rebelled against Me," although nothing could possibly be done for them that He had not done. See in confirmation of these statements Ex. iv, 2, 23; Ezek. xvi, 14; Jer. xiii, 7; Isa. l, 2, 3, 4. Then when Jesus came in humiliation as their Messiah they despised Him and rejected Him and killed Him, and the night before they crucified Him He went forth with His little band over the same Kidron and to the same Olivet (verses 23, 30), for the people had said, "We have no king but Cæsar." In due time Absalom was slain, and David returned to his throne and kingdom. So in due time the great adversary shall perish and Jesus shall reign (Rev. xx, 13, 19; xi, 15). David did not return until the men of Judah as one man sent him this word, "Return thou and all thy servants" (xix, 14), and we cannot but wonder what might take place if in response to our Lord's threefold "Surely I come quickly" of Rev. xxii the church should as one person cry: "Amen! Even so come, Lord Jesus!" With all her divisions and on the part of the majority no expectation of His return we cannot think that the church ever will be of one mind on this point, but we rejoice to believe that in the fullness of time, the church being completed, He will come to the air to welcome her to Himself and then return with her in His glory for this same Israel's benefit and to subdue all things unto Himself.

During the time of His rejection may we be found like the servants of verse 15, the 99 of verse 18 and those of verse 21. It is surely a small thing for us to say as His redeemed, and yet something we ought to say, "Behold, thy servants are ready to do whatsoever my Lord the King shall appoint" and hold ourselves for any manner of service wholly at His commandment (I Chron. xxviii, 21). The 990 recall the whole Adullam story of the faithful followers and their reward when he came to the throne. It is his memorable words, "As the Lord liveth and as my Lord the King liveth, surely in what place my Lord the King shall be, whether in death or life, even there also will thy servant be," remind us of the devotion of Ruth, another gentle, and point us on to the time when all gentile nations shall manifest a similar devotion to Israel because of the Lord who shall reign in their midst. David's submission to God is seen in his sending back the ark of the covenant to Jerusalem, saying, "If I shall find favor in the eyes of the Lord He will bring me again." * * * behold, here am I. Let him do to me as seemeth good unto Him" (verses 21-25). He was filled with sorrow, yet his mind was stayed upon Jehovah. Our blessed Lord in the midst of His great sorrow gave the disciples His peace and prayed that they might have His joy, a peace and joy independent of circumstances because it cometh from God.
