**A SWORD OF HONOR.**  
**ROSEBERY'S WARNING**  
**Imperial Aspirations and the Irish Question.**

Cape Town's Gift to Lord Kitchener Presented to the Distinguished Soldier in London Thursday Night.  
 London, Aug. 1.—Amid tremendous enthusiasm, Lord Kitchener was last night presented with a sword of honor, the gift of Cape Town. Sir Joseph Bland, Lord Mayor of London, made the presentation in the course of a South African dinner, which was attended by many notable persons.  
 When the enthusiasm had sufficiently subsided for Lord Kitchener to make himself heard, he modestly returned thanks for the gift, and expressed the confident hope that, in South Africa, at any rate, the sword would not again be drawn from its scabbard.  
 Lord Kitchener eulogized Lord Milner, British High Commissioner in South Africa, and made an appeal, based upon his intimate and personal friendship with and knowledge of the South African administrator, that he give the confidence and support of the British nation.  
 Referring to the mineral and agricultural wealth of the new territory, Lord Kitchener said: "You may say yourselves that you have nothing less than the makings of a new America in the Southern Hemisphere."  
 He said the question who would supply the energy, brains and money to carry out this great development was more one for his hearers than for himself, but when, as in South Africa, patriotism was joined with self-interest, he was not afraid they would fail to do their best and reap the harvest, for which he hoped that those who had recently been in South Africa had prepared.  
**CHAMBERLAIN INVITES BORS.**  
 Will Discuss With Them the Conditions of Peace.  
 London, Aug. 1.—The Paris correspondent of The Times says a professor telegraphic agency which often receives authoritative information from Bors sources, states that Bors, Meyer and Lucas are coming to Europe at the express and direct invitation of Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, Colonial Secretary. It is stated that Mr. Chamberlain wishes to consult with Bors and Lucas on the construction of the conditions of peace in South Africa, and the general situation there.

**SPARE THEM TO THE LIBERALS.**  
 London, Aug. 1.—An announcement is made that Earl Beauchamp, who had been allowing himself to become dissociated from the Liberal aspirations of the nation, the party had decided to continue the speaker, by his unfortunate attitude in regard to the Irish question, and until the Imperial Liberal principles prevailed within it there will be necessity for the continued existence of the Liberal League, which Lord Rosebery said did not threaten international union, but formed a rallying point for others sharing the principles of its promoters.  
**AID FOR STORM SUFFERERS.**  
 Ontario Government Sends Mr. A. W. Campbell to Investigate the Matter.  
 Toronto, Aug. 1.—The Cabinet met yesterday with Hon. Mr. Harcourt, Premier, presiding. It was decided to send A. W. Campbell to Stormont and Dundas to enquire into the extent of the damage done by the recent storms, in anticipation of an application for relief. Several letters were read, intimating an application would be sent in due course. If assistance is granted in this case, it will be a precedent as far as relieving the needs of people rendered destitute by storms, as well as those who have many children where aid was granted to sufferers. Principal among the cases is the grant of \$25,000 to the sufferers in the Hull-Ottawa, fire, to Prescott and Russell County of \$5,000, to Westminster, B. C., St. John, and other places.  
 The main question before the meeting was relating to water powers at Niagara Falls. After discussion it was decided that the decision would be given in the matter not later than Tuesday morning.  
**The Report of Hemlock.**  
 It was learned at the Department of Forestry yesterday that the chief object in putting an export duty on hemlock was to prevent its exportation, especially in view of the fact that the value of this particular wood has increased lately in the markets on the other side of the line. It is taking the place to a large extent of the common class of pine in the construction of houses and barns and other coarse work. Of course another object is to compel any manufacturer with Canadian hemlock to be done in this country.  
 Hon. Mr. Harcourt, acting Premier, has sent Mr. Burke, one of the forestry inspectors, to conduct an investigation into the matter, and to certify the amount resulting in the death of the late Mr. Hesse, M.P., at Green Siding.

**A BURGLAR SENTENCED.**  
 Gerrie's Postmaster Passes After Long Life in the Village—Dr. Dalton McCarthy in Toronto at Orangeville.  
 It is announced that the Yukon territorial agents will get on strike until they have heard Mr. Parie's final decision as to their demands.  
 Montreal customs receipts for the month of July reached \$989,185.70, or the same month last year \$2,653,070.70. Editor William MacAdam's apology for the same month last year, which was accepted by the full court of British Columbia, and the judges have writ Ottawa recommending his release.  
 One of Gerrie's oldest residents in the parish of Holy Trinity, postmaster, passed away this evening. He was 67th year. Deceased long in the same continuously for the past 42 years.  
 A young lad of 10, named Claude Gillard, met his death at the Bridge Works by being run over by a large engine and work, with the result that his chest was crushed in.  
 A case from the Casualty Department of Cape Town states that the late Mr. J. A. Crossland of the 3rd Life Guard, crossed land to Peterborough, Ont.  
 Albert Sinclair, a young man, who was convicted of burglarizing the store of George Anderson, at Wellington, near Belleville, was Thursday morning sentenced by Judge Lewis to nine months in the Central Prison.  
 At Quebec Thursday afternoon a fireman named Lemieux, employed by the Jacques-Cartier Electric and Power Company, fell from a live wire and he fell head-first to the ground, breaking his neck. Death was instantaneous.  
 Thursday morning before daybreak, burglars entered the houses of O. E. Fleming, and H. F. Sutherland, in connection with the latter being confronted by a man with a revolver. At Detroit Bertha Travers was arrested and brought to Windsor in connection with the affair.  
 Dr. Dalton McCarthy, son of Judge McCarthy, is under bail at Orangeville and will appear on Saturday to answer charges of assaulting Mrs. Mungovan wife of the editor of The Post. It is alleged that he was shot down and kicked by Mrs. Mungovan is seriously injured.
