he completely ignored the serivces renlered by Capt. Townsend of the steamer Tees, without whose aid most undoubtedly the poor shipwrecked men would have had to endure for many more hours the harships and suffering which their very perilous situation en-

an eyewitness of all that took place from the moment the wreck was sighted till the last soul was rescued, can attest to the facts which are as follows: "On Saturday afternoon, January 23rd, somewhere about 2 o'clock, the wreck was sighted on the Bird rocks by the second mate, who was on watch, and immediately called the captain, who, with his usual promptitude, at once ordered the steamer's course to be shaped towards the wreck, coming as close to the rocks as was prudent with safety. No signs of life were manifest either on board or on the rocks for some time. Latterly with glasses it was believed a man was visible on deck, and smoke either on the rocks or on shore. Capt. Townsend at once had a boat lowered, manned by Chief Officer Gillam and four of the crew, taking with them life belts, buoys and ropes. While this was going on the steamer Leebro also was drawing near and lowered a boat, which turned out to be manned by the life-saving crew from Banfield. The Tees' boat was first on the scene, however, and when joined by the other boat, they wrought together for about an hour, endeavoring but without effect, owing to the heavy sea running, to make a landing to take off six men who now showed up on the rocks, having left the wreck at low tide. The Leebro's boat was twice filled and the crew saved by the Tees' boat. Ultimately a line was got to the rocks and the men one by one dragged through the sea in a lifebuoy to the Tees' boat, and subsequently brought on board the steamer, where the chief steward, Mr. Richards, had comfortable beds wait-

ing them, and supplied them with all that was useful in food. "As daylight was now almost gone thing more could be done till the following morning, so both steamers put into Banfield for the night.

"It was reported at Banfield from Cape Beale that the Neah Bay life-boat and the American cutter Manning made an attempt at rescue with the searchlight but evidently without re-
