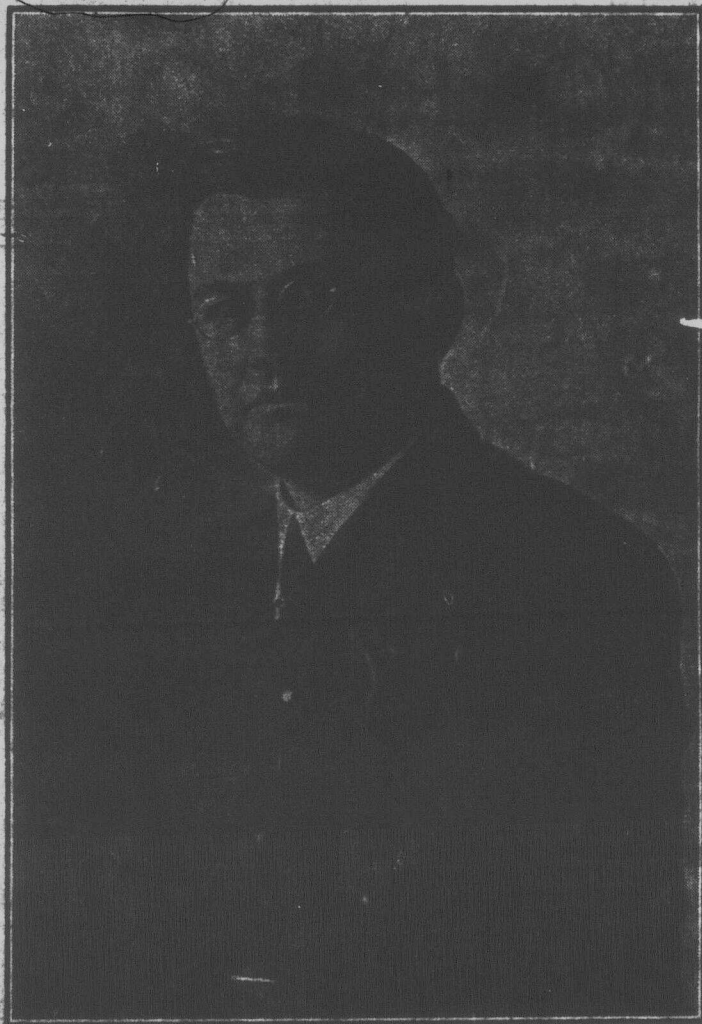

Father Fitz-Henry Was Drowned

Formerly Assistant Priest at
Renous and Millerton.

Many will regret to hear of the drown-
ing of Rev. Father R. H. Fitz-Henry,
near Kingston, Ont.

The late reverend gentleman was assist-
ant priest to Rev. E. S. Murdock for up-
wards of a year. He moved from here
last July.

Kingston, May 27—The body of a man
was washed ashore at the coal works
wharf at the foot of Gore Street. It was
removed to Corbett's morgue and later
identified as that of Father R. H. Fitz-
henry, formerly Chaplain of St. Mary's
of the Lake Orphanage of this city. Fa-
ther Fitzhenry disappeared about the
end of December last, and it was sup-
posed he was drowned. He belonged to
the fathers of the Holy cross, and was
ordained a priest about eight years ago.
The deceased was about thirty-three
years of age. The remains were taken to
Montreal.
