CANADA'S RECORD IN CHEESE EXPORTS. OTTAWA Sent 11 -Some highly inport of cheese and butter to Great Britain are given in a report received at the Department of Trade and Commerce from Mr. W. A. McKinnon, Camerce from Mr. W. A. McKinnon, Ca-nadian trade agent at Bristol. Quot-ing from the Colonial Dairy Produce Review, Mr. McKinnon says that, out of total imports of 130,062 tons of cheese by Great Britain during the past year, Canada supplied 95,884 tons. This was over eight times the quantity received from the next largest exporting country, which was Holland. During the year the exports of Canadian butter to Great Britain totalled 15,145 tons, an increase of 2,300 tons. This constitutes a new record, the previous highest record being 13,200 tons. As a result of the hot and dry summer, the production of English butter and cheese was curtailed, and, as a result, the trade agent says the Canadian
