START PAYING OLD

AGE PENSIONS TODAY

What is Due Them Under Britain's New Law.

LONDON, Jan. 1—Postmasters hroughout the United Kingdom have pday commenced the payment of old the pensions under the act of the last ession of Parliament to persons over eventy years of age. Seven hundred housand applicants for pensions have been received, of which 200,000 rere disallowed, chiefly because the applicants have been in receipt of poor

elief.

It is estimated that the old age pentons will cost the country \$35,000,000 innually. The highest pension is five hillings weekly, which will be paid to ipplicants having an income below 105 a year. If their income exceeds 105 but is less than \$155 small mounts will be paid.
