

EXPLAINS SCHEME

Board Passes Resolution Rec-

ommending That Govt. Consider Plan

MONTREAL, Feb. 26.—The Board of Trade of Montreal today at a special meeting heard an address by J. S. Armstrong, C. E., of St. John, on his scheme for constructing a submarine bridge through the St. Lawrence at Quebec instead of re-building the fallen with a view of impressing congress bridge through the St. Lawrence at Quebec instead of re-building the falless over-head bridge.
