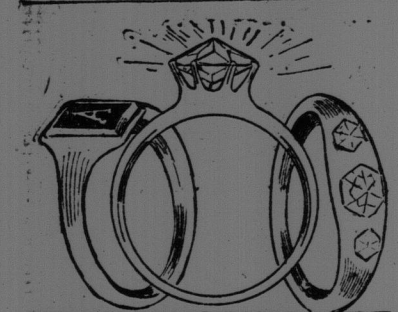

LOCAL NEWS

English mails from S. S. Teutonic have left New York and are due here at noon tomorrow.

Mrs. R. J. Livingstone has sold her house on North street to Mr. George McLaughlin, who takes charge on September first.

The fishing schooner Athlete arrived at Gloucester Saturday and reported the loss of Joseph Shaw, a young unmarried man of Argyle, N. S. The accident happened at Sable Island. While the men were trying to tie up the mull-sail a heavy sea washed Shaw overboard.

The disappearance of Earle Hines, son of John Hines, of Sanford Street, married the daughter of the principal at the Park Street Presbyterian Sunday school outing at Prince Lodge, N. S., yesterday. A vigorous search was organized and although the territory had been systematically covered, no trace of the missing lad has been found. The police and militia united in the search for Hines.

George Burton Vessey the 14 years old son of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. J. Vessey, of Annapolis, was drowned in the Kennebecasis River yesterday afternoon while bathing. The boy had purchased a pair of water wings to aid him in learning to swim. Shortly after the alarm had been given the body was recovered and carried to the village. The boy is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Heber Wyles, of Calhoun; Miss Pearl, stenographer in Lawyer McMacKinn's office, Sussex, and Miss Nellie at home.

On Monday last about one hundred relatives and friends gathered at Bonnie Brae, the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Haddock, Dalhousie, to celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of their wedding. Mr. and Mrs. Haddock are well known throughout the North Shore and were the recipients of many handsome gifts and messages of congratulations. Mr. Haddock has been a member of the Dalhousie Division of Sons of Temperance for over half a century.

The mayor and three councillors of Bridgewater, N. S., are being sued in the courts by C. A. Starratt, a merchant. The claim is against these gentlemen for \$20.00 penalty for each that they acted or sat as members of the town council of the Town of Bridgewater for a writ of inquiry to ascertain how many times they had so acted or sat, and for an injunction to restrain them from acting in that capacity. They don't use, understand or care for the law. These actions will be tried before the supreme court in October.

MISS ESTHER WHITE
IS ALIVE AND WELLReport of Her Murder Involves
Mistaken IdentityWoman Killed in Boston is Unknown to
Her—She Was Here a Few Days Ago
and is Now in Fredericton.

A despatch in the morning papers through the Associated Press from Boston states that Miss Esther O. White, St. John girl, who for the past six years has been living in Worcester, where she graduated in the city hospital, was found murdered in a Boston boarding house. Miss White at the present time is visiting in Fredericton, and her friends with whom she is a guest were naturally very much surprised this morning to learn of her murder. They don't use, understand how it could happen. She had been in St. John for the past five weeks, going to Fredericton on Tuesday with Miss Helen Burden, an intimate friend who is also a graduate of the Worcester Hospital. She will return to this city in a day or two, and intends going back to Worcester next week to resume her practice. Apparently the name of the murdered girl was found in the file of Miss E. White of Worcester, and in the hurry to identify her the Associated Press correspondent no doubt jumped to the conclusion that Miss Esther O. White of Worcester was the same person.

Misses White and Burden have been visiting John H. Case, 124 Waterloo street, who was very much surprised at the reports in the morning papers. The family were formerly residents of the city, and until Mr. M. J. White's death in 1892 the firm of Kierstead & White was well known. Mrs. White and her family moved to the States about four years ago and now reside in Hartford, Conn.

Mrs. White is at present visiting a son, E. A. White, in Halifax, and a telegram was sent this morning by her son, J. Warren White, who is at present in the city, stating the fact of the case.

Miss Elizabeth M. White, a sister in Worcester, upon hearing the report from the Associated Press reporters wired Mr. Case, who immediately answered, allaying her fears.

Miss Esther O. White graduated about four years ago from the Worcester Hospital and since that time has been practicing there, but was not employed in the office of Dr. Edward Cooper as the despatch indicates.

To The Star J. Warren White stated that the only apparent reason for the mistake was that upon referring to the nurse's directory his sister's name was mistaken for Ethel. Information was immediately sought from Miss E. M. White of Worcester, who stated her sister was visiting in the province.

Many friends of Miss White throughout the city will be pleased to learn that this morning's despatches have no personal bearing upon the case so far as she is concerned. Miss White and Miss Burden left Fredericton this morning by boat for St. John.

MRS. RICHMOND HELD
FOR THE GRAND JURYSent Up on Charge of Killing
McTavishWitnesses Tell of Happenings in the
Boarding House Where P. E. Island
Man Was Murdered.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Aug. 4.—Mrs. Elizabeth Richmond was held without bail by Judge Almy in the Cambridge district court yesterday for the murder of Stewart McTavish in the Hotel Florence, East Cambridge, on Friday, July 23. She was at once taken to East Cambridge jail, where she will await the sitting of the September grand jury at Lowell.

McTavish had tarried for a few days at the hotel previous to starting on a vacation from his duties at the state colony for the insane in Gardner, where he was employed. It was his intention to go to his home in Nova Scotia, but according to witnesses yesterday there

was a great deal of drinking at the hotel after his arrival, and he and Mrs. Richmond were very friendly and much together.

Dist. Atty. Higgins had charge of the prosecution yesterday and was assisted by Captain P. F. Hurley and Lieut. James P. Hall, who have had charge of the police work in the case. Mrs. Richmond, who appeared in court stylishly attired in a silk shirtwaist and a black silk skirt, was represented by Ralph W. Glog.

WOMAN ASSISTS ATTORNEY.

She followed the proceedings with the utmost care, and several times summoned Atty. Glog to her side. They conferred earnestly on each occasion, and at the end of each conference the lawyer began a new line of cross-examination of the witnesses, of whom 20 had been summoned, but of whom only four were called.

Medical Examiner William D. Swan first testified to the condition of the body and the nature of the wounds from which death resulted. He said there were several of them about the head, one a gunshot wound on the right side.

John Drohan, the cook at the Hotel Florence, described the finding of McTavish's body and the position of the body on the bed where he and Timothy J. Clifford, a boarder, discovered it.

"Mrs. Richmond was lying on the bedroom floor," he said. "I had previously seen her in the sitting room," he continued, "and the last time I saw McTavish alive was on Thursday. I did not see Mrs. Richmond on that day."

He was asked as to whether or not he knew there was an axe in the cellar.

"I did," he replied. I have used it many times."

He said that he had seen McTavish coming from a room on the top floor, and that Mrs. Richmond was lying in the bed in the room in a drunken condition. He said that the arrival of McTavish in the house had been the cause of commotion among the boarders. One of them, Clifford, who was with him when the body was discovered, had remarked that the "nervous cholera" was back again, and that there was sure to be trouble at the house.

DENIES KILLING MCTAVISH.

"You didn't kill McTavish, did you?" asked District Attorney Higgins.

"I did not," replied Drohan. Timothy J. Clifford declared he came home to dinner on Friday and found Mrs. Richmond on the kitchen floor, "dead to the world."

"I asked Drohan if he was there, and he said he didn't know. I remarked that we'd better find out. We then went upstairs and found the body in the room locked. We got it open and found the body on the bed."

"My God, she's killed him," shouted Drohan. "I heard the shot but thought it was in the street."

"I never saw the like before, and hope I never will again," he finished impressively, as he described the scene in the room.

"Did you kill McTavish?" asked the district attorney.

"No. Do you think I'm crazy? No," answered Clifford.

John A. O'Hern testified to paying a bill water tax for Mrs. Richmond at Cambridge City Hall on the day of the murder. He said that she was sober when she gave him the money and asked him to pay the bill.

Atty. Glog declared no evidence had been introduced to support the charge of murder against Mrs. Richmond, but Judge Almy found probable cause and ordered the woman held.

Rev. Frank L. Orchard, of McAdam, and Rev. J. Harry Puddington, of Millville, York County, have been registered to solemnize marriages.
