PAROLE IN WIFE'S CUSTODY HUSBAND'S PUNISHMENT

"Take Him Home and Tell Him what You Think of Him," Says Policeman E. Aloysius Kennedy, after Getting that Duty off His Own Chest.

(New York Herald.) Contrary to the rule which governs such cases, a young woman who had caused the arrest of her husband and put the police to the trouble of taking him to the west side court yesterday announced that she had no intention of withdrawing her complaint. Policeman E. Aloysius Kennedy looked at her and made no attempt to conceal his surprise. "You don't mean to say," he asked, "that you're not sorry for the poor man? Think of the humiliation you made him suffer when I arrested him in the saloon."

"I never kicked yet when I had to do my duty," said Kennedy, "and when it's my duty to go into a saloon I go into the saloon, but I certainly hated to pinch your husband. All the way to the station house he kept telling me I made a mistake and that I must be looking for another fellow of the same name. He says he's got a double too, that looks like him. 'If the double acts like him he ought to be in jail too,' said the young woman, glaring at her unhappy husband. He was boring holes in the floor with his eyes. 'There he stood,' said Kennedy, 'leaning against the bar entirely surrounded by thirsty friends. Boys he was saying, 'you all know me, but what I can't understand is how that boss of ours gets away with it. He's no better than any of us.' And then some fellow that ordered a 20 cent drink when your husband bought the beer of ours gets away with it. He's your husband; he ain't half as good as you are. By rights you ought to have his job. And then your husband would say, 'I'm always forgetting our telephone number. He doesn't even remember the name of our street.' It gets so he hasn't money enough for a taxi and has to take a car."

"He was having such a nice time when I butted in," said Kennedy. "He was doing all the buying and all the talking, and his friends say 'we have anything to do except drink and listen to him. Once in a while one of his friends would sneak a dollar bill off a roll and slide the roll back into his pocket and put the dollar bill on the bar and say, 'This is my turn,' and then your husband would push the dollar bill back and say, 'cut it out into the grape,' and then your husband's friends would give various reasons why they didn't like to drink wine. After they all got through giving their reasons they got talking about the different brands, and then they all decided the brand your husband said was the best really was the best, and when they saw he was going to pay for it they got reasonable and said, 'Let's sit down on those leather seats and have the waiter serve it over there.' And they all said your husband's story of the way he walked the streets here for months before he could get a job where he could show what he was made of was

"they don't deserve to have good wives." Kennedy assured her. "Say," said the husband despondently, "send me to jail, will you? I don't want to be talked to death." Kennedy gave her no response. Kennedy asked him, "You broke and remorse is one of the few things you can get without money."

WOMAN'S SUFFRAGE

Among the better class of opponents of woman suffrage, there is a growing tendency to regard the vote according to that women have not intelligence enough to vote, and to base opposition mainly on the "division of labor." We are a dozen women and men. The division is marked by a growing division of labor and specialization of industry; that it is in accordance with this to let men take charge of the domestic work; and that to admit women to the ballot would be a return toward barbarism.

It is true that the progress of civilization has been marked by a growing division of labor between man and woman and woman and man, but not between men and women. Thus in the early days, every man dug down trees and built his own house, raised animals and killed them for meat; and himself prepared his own clothing. His work is divided up between the carpenter, the butcher and the tanner. In the old days, every housewife spun and wove cloth, dyed it, and made it up into garments for her family, and also made butter and cheese, soap and candles. Now this work is divided up among a dozen women and men.

A hundred years ago, hardly any occupations were open to women except housework and sewing. Now the census of 1900 shows that out of the hundreds of trades and professions followed by men, the only ones in which no women are found are the work of soldiers and sailors, and telegraph and telephone linemen. Nothing could be more untrue than to say that the progress of civilization is marked by more and more rigid division of labor between the sexes.

Some people admit that the trend of the times has been to open more employment to women, but do not see it as a calamity for women to engage in wage-earning occupations outside their homes; and, by an odd confusion of ideas, they make the argument against equal suffrage. But this is to mix up a political question with a purely economic one. Whether it is right for women to do one thing, or whether it is wise for her to work for money outside her home is quite another. There is no evidence that their homes in the States where woman vote than in the States where they do not. Wyoming has had full woman suffrage ever since 1893; yet, according to the census of 1900, Wyoming has the smallest proportion of unmarried women to its population of any state in the union, and presumably the smallest proportion of women who are obliged to engage in wage-earning occupations outside their homes.

The "specialization of industry" has no bearing on the question. Voting is not an industry. The progress of civilization has not been to restrict the suffrage more and more narrowly, but to extend it to one class after another. The most advanced nations today are not those where all political power is concentrated in the hands of a single class, but those in which it is most widely shared among the people. And the best government is found where the largest number of the people actually perform their political duties, not where they neglect to vote and leave public affairs to be managed by a small class of "professional politicians."
