

A TEST BETTING CASE. **RING STARS**

New York, May 11.—The oral or memoranda system of recording bets at the race tracks, which has been practiced in New York state since the antigambling law went into effect, will be tested by a suit now in progress in the courts of Long Island. Those responsible for the test hope to be able to substitute for the present system a method calling for a deposit of cash with a stakeholder.

Two men who made a cash bet at the meeting of the Rockaway Huiting club a few days ago and a stakeholder who held the money were selected for a test of the law, it was learned today. All three have been held for the grand jury at Cedurhurst, Long Island. This was intended as a preliminary to an appeal of the supreme court for a writ of habaes corpus, in which it will be contended that the cash bet was not a violation of the law.

RAIN BLOCKS NEW ORLEANS BOUTS.


