**Fire Almost Wiped Out Quebec Village**

Dozen Places of Business and Three Residences Are Burned at Shawville.

Ottawa, April 27.—The greater part of the business section of Shawville, Que., is in ruins today as a result of a fire which broke out about one o'clock this morning and lasted until about 4.30 o'clock. A rough estimate of the damage is between \$60,000 and \$70,000 the greater part of which is covered by insurance.

Fully a dozen places of business and three residences were destroyed the greater number of which were of wooden construction, which considerably hampered the fire fighters in their efforts.

**CIRCUIT COURT.**

In the paper industry, they have for many months, pointed out to investing readers, that the position of most of our Canadian pulp and paper concerns has been such that they have had to expand in many directions. **Theodore Amburg Given Seven Years**

Obtained Money Under False Pretences—Charge Against Six Boys Resumed.

A case against Emmet Burke charged with obtaining money under false pretences was resumed in the police court yesterday. The man whose arrest on the premises with liquor in his possession led to the charges, testified that the defendant was not on the premises at the time of his arrest, and so far as he knew had no knowledge of his being there. He himself had purchased the bottle on Main street and no liquor had been taken out of it with the exception of one drink which he had himself on Acadia street, and that which the inspectors washed their hands in.
