From Ottawa. (Special to the Tribune.) OTTAWA, March 19. St. John's Concert over the Link to its utmost capacity last night. Some could not get admittance; 1,500 to 2,000 were present.

Short addresses were given by the Presidents of other National Societies, father O'Connor, the Mayor, and Sir John A. MacDonal.

The latter was received, on rising, with a shower of applause repeated at every sentence of his speech, and redoubled at the close. He avoided politics and spoke in a humorous vein, claiming St. Patrick was a Scotchman, &c.

British and Foreign. [By Telegraph to Associated Press.] LONDON, March 18. In the Commons, to night, Gladstone stated that the reply of the American Government to the American note, received on the 14th inst., was gratified to be able to state, was couched in courteous and friendly terms. (Cheers.) Our views, he continued, are not adopted. Hence, in the opinion of the Government, an answer is required, which the Government of the United States appears to invite.

This answer will be delivered to the American Minister in London before Thursday of present week.

It would be inconsistent with public interest to lay correspondence before Parliament at present, particularly as Congress of the United States has declined to act of their President.

The tenor of our communication while it shows that we are anxious to carry the Treaty into execution, it is true, not fall in that sense of the State and the nature of the case which the honor of the country demands. The statement of the Premier was received with loud cheers.

Earl Granville, in Lords, in reply to enquiry of Earl Malmesbury concerning correspondence added that papers would be produced as soon as possible.—He assured their Lordships that he was aware of the public anxiety on the subject and the grave responsibility attaching to the Government with it.

It is rumored that General Bourbaki's challenge to Marshall Baraquay D'Hilliers Republican List, in Assembly, will not oppose war estimates as agreed upon by President Thiers and Budget Committee.

The assassin of Earl Mayo, before being executed, confessed that the death of the Victoria was not the result of conspiracy, as he alone designed and carried out the murder. He said he intended to kill General Stewart, who accompanied the Earl, and was only prevented from executing his purpose by the promptness of his arrest after attacking the Victoria.

THE LEGISLATURE.

(Special Telegram to the Daily Tribune.)

YESTERDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

FRANCIS, March 19. How went into Committee of the Whole on the Bill to incorporate the Knickerbocker Mining and Manufacturing Company of Albert County. Progress reported.

The Surveyor General laid on the table the papers in connection with the claims of Margaret McPhelin.

Wedburn introduced a Bill relating to the several County Courts in the Province of New Brunswick.

Crawford a Bill to enable the President and Directors of the Moosepath Driving Park to borrow money on the surety of their real estate for the purposes connected therewith.

Willis moved the House in Committee on a Bill to incorporate the Grand Southern Railway Company to build a road between St. John and St. Stephen, agreed to.

House in Committee agreed to a Bill to incorporate Union Hall Company of Andover.

Bill to incorporate St. John New Brunswick Corresponding Committee of the Colonial and Continental Church Society agreed to.

Donald called attention to an article in the Express of 18th inst., which said he had been made a tool of by the Opposition in reference to the despatch he had received, which was insinuated to have been given. He said the author of the article should be ashamed like a noxious reptile, and that the article was a lie from beginning to end.

On the Want of Confidence motion, Blanchard spoke against the Government, and charged Napier with appropriating three hundred and forty-nine dollars of by road money.

Napier got in a great rage, and called Blanchard a dirty scound.

Weather here last night very cold. A locomotive left for Fredericton Junction yesterday morning but only got a mile and a half from the depot up to last evening.

Hon. G. E. King presided at the annual meeting of the Missionary Society last evening, and addressed the audience at length.

His Excellency, Gov. Wilnot, led the choir of Sunday School children. The collection in aid of the cause among the heathens was large.
