According to Peter Vanderleeden, Director of Personnel Services, when a job is available, and there might be extreme interest from within the university, it is first advertised internally, and then publicly. The best applicant usually gets the job, he said. However, if there are two equally qualified applicants, the one from within the university usually gets it. This is not always the case. The final decision regarding the hiring of an applicant is made by the department head.

In the case of the Overseas Student Advisor, a "search committee" is set up to review the applicants, and the Dean of

Students makes the final decision. The High School Relations Officer's job entails a considerable amount of travelling and meeting with high school principals and counsellors in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Quebec. He or she will also be

responsible for the supervision of visitation days on campus. The High School Relations Officer works closely with the Registrar's The Overseas Student Advisor

works closely with, yet independently from the Dean of Students. The advisor is responsible for making contact with overseas students and the provision of information to those students before their arrival in Canada. The advisor also works closely with the Canadian International Dev-

elopment Agency (C.I.D.A.), community ethnic groups and service organizations. The advisor is generally the first person directly associated with the university that the student meets upon his arrival. It is also the responsibility of the advisor to see that the student has decent accommodations, to counsel and guide the student, and to help him or her integrate into the community and university life and

finally into Canadian culture. The importance of this job can be realized by the fact that in the 1975-1976 year, there were 57 countries represented at the university, and 423 non-Canadian students.

Stocker was the first Overseas Student Advisor for the university. Her interest in the area began when she was the chairman of the World Service at the YM-YWCA. They worked with the overseas students from the university. They later formed a special committee to work with the students. In 1965, she began working

with the university on a part-time basis, and the following year, she became a full-time employee.

Stocker is also the co-ordinator of CIDA and manages the contracts with CIDA and the Swedish Development Agency for the university.

Stocker said that a lot of personal involvement and thought is put into the job. One has to be close to the students, but not get too personal. She also said that she would like to see overseas students more easily integrated


