**Taxi driver charges 'political powerplay'**

Air Terminal Transport limousine drivers have been caught in a "political powerplay" and as a result 16 drivers have been laid off, driver James Pringle says.

Pringle charged the Department of Transport with "non action and indifference" for allowing metered cab drivers to break the law at International airport.

The limousine service has told drivers that earnings are down because of competition from metered cabs. "Healthy competition is one thing but complete disregard of airport regulations, verbal solicitation, theft, refusal of fares and assaults on police officers can in no way be construed as healthy competition."

Pringle said a July letter of complaint to Peel South MP Hyl Chappell had not been answered.

"This interest is typical of Ottawa's indifference" he said.

Airline Terminal Transport once had exclusive rights to fares at the airport, but cabbies were allowed limited access over a year ago.
