Township Councils.

DOVER COUNCIL.

The council met pursuant to adjournment at the Town Hall, Oct. 21. The members were all present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted. W. G. McGeorge's reports were read and adopted. A communication was read from the Clerk of Tilbury East and a copy of resolution of said Township Council re a proposed ferry across the River Thames at Jeannette's Creek station. A by-law to divert part of the highway road in the 5th concession west of Big Point road was read and finally passed; also a by-law to impose a percentage on taxes remaining on a certain date. A motion was read from Eugene Martin stating that the bridge at his place over the Hind drain on the 9th concession is in a bad state of repair. Tenders for printing township by-laws, 300 pamphlets, from The Planet, Banner-News, W. R. Baxter and Con. E. Shea respectively, were opened and read. Moved by Grant and Trudell, that the grievance of Mrs. R. A. Harris be referred to Mr. Crawford and report.—Carried.

Moved by Trudell and Grant, that the grievance of Eugene Martin re bridge be referred to Mr. Wright with power and report.—Carried. Moved by Wright and Crawford, that John Bishop be paid \$20.66 for three sheep and four lambs killed; Peter Faubert \$12 for two sheep killed and one damaged; Geo. Crawford \$23.33 for two sheep and three lambs killed and two lambs damaged by dogs, being two-thirds value in each case, as per inspectors, and charged to sheep and dog account.—Carried. Chas. Hart be paid \$1.50 and J. H. Clements \$1.50 for assisting in restaking the Wilcox-Ouellette drain.—Carried.

Moved by Crawford and Grant, that Lawrence Doyle be paid \$1.50 for one day inspecting sheep killed by dogs.—Carried. Moved by Grant and Wright, that the Banner-News account, \$8.40, be paid for advertising road notice and for tenders for printing township by-laws; Planet, \$7.20, advertising re Voters' List.—Carried.

Moved by Wright and Crawford, that Moses Bourassa, John Harris, John Bachelder, A. Reaume, Jr., C. Labadie, A. J. Thibodeau and James Fox be each paid \$1 for pathmasters' returns.—Carried.

Moved by Crawford and Trudell, that W. G. McGeorge's account, \$13, be paid for inspecting work on Wilcox-Ouellette drain and restaking same; \$6.50 inspecting work on Jack's Creek drain; \$7.00 inspecting work on 18th concession road drain.—Carried.

Moved by Trudell and Grant, that Wm. Neff be allowed to have a water main laid along the southerly side of the River Road from the city limits westerly to his premises on giving satisfactory agreement to keep the road at all times in good repair for the travelling public, and to pay the charges of preparing the agreement, and the Reeve be appointed to attend to the matter and report.—Carried.

SERVANTS IN GERMANY
The Whole Subject Is Under the Control of the Police. A group of bright women sat discussing their travels abroad. All had made something more than a tour of European hotels and all had observed something of interest to women outside the beaten tracks.

"The methods by which they eliminate the 'servant girl question' in Germany," said one—the wife of a professor in an important American university—"are very interesting. They go at it with the same thoroughness with which the German attacks everything, whether a rare species of beetle or the organization of the army."

"The whole subject is under the control of the police. They have every servant girl listed. If a housewife requires help in her kitchen, but is unable to pay much for it, by application to the proper authorities she can secure a young girl without experience. A contract is made for a year. The employer agrees to feed and clothe the girl and to teach her certain specified things in housekeeping, but no wages are paid. At the end of the year the housewife can retain the girl by paying her small wages and agreeing to continue her education in household work to a certain specified extent."

"The things she is to teach are nominated in the bond, and she is expected to rigidly carry out her end of the agreement in consideration of the fact that she is little or no wages. In this way, you see, the servant serves an apprenticeship. It is much superior, I think, to our way, in which we take ignorant girls, teach them everything they know, even to speak English, and pay them nearly or quite as much as a well trained servant."

"If you want a thoroughly competent servant in Germany you can get one at a specified price. And you can examine the record of every girl at the police station. If she has ever been discharged, you will find the fact there, with the reasons therefor, and thus can tell her character at a glance without resort to the farcical letter of recommendation given by a former employer."

"As the system implies, every German woman is an absolutely competent housewife. She knows the business of running a house thoroughly. Young girls of good family after they leave school often go to some particularly competent housewife, whom they pay to put the finishing touches upon their education in this respect. I knew one such woman who brought up three sons by means of taking boarders and of teaching young women of good families in the manner described."

"That was a good picture in the paper yesterday of your son, the football player, Mr. Husking?" "Yess, I knew who 'twas just as soon as I seen the name under it."
