(Special Staff Corre Toronto, July 13.—Ontario is now ooking forward to a light grain crop his year. The lightest crop the produce has seen in years will be the hay

Toing clover was checked by the drought of last summer, and further injured by the dry cold weather of early spring. Finally a dry, hot June restarded growth in the old meadows. The result is that in large areas hay will not go beyond half a ton to the acre, and all over the Province the crop will be short.

Fall sown grains, where not winter killed, will do well; but there was a good deal of killing out last winter. All spring cereals will be short in the straw, but recent rains should cause heads to full fairly well. Taking grain crops as a whole they will not be up to the average.

Damage to Corn.

Considerable damage was done to the corn crop in some sections by the frost in June, but where that was escaped corn is doing exceptionally well. The feed situation in the Province depends more on the out-turn in this wing of crops than ever before. With a good lot of corn fodder the winter may be passed over without srave inconvenience. If for any reason corn should fall the result will be disastrous. In any case the situation is such as to call for the most careful savings of every pound of feed. So far as the apple crop is concerned the outlook is quite encouraging. At one time the fear was for over-production the world over, and consequently low prices. The June drop, resulting from drouth, and injury by tent caterpillars combined, have removed all danger of this so far as Ontario is concerned. Present indications points to a normal crop in this Province, with quality excellent in Well cared for orchards.
