

whether the sixth toast contained in the printed paper mentioned in the resolve of the Assembly of the seventh instant, (which resolve was shown to him) was one of the toasts given at that dinner, but he recollects some were given similar to the seventh, eighth, ninth and twelfth; that with respect to the tenth, he cannot say whether it was given; and as to the eleventh, when it was given, he recollects he did not know what it meant, but he was informed that a Bill had been brought in for the insertion of Advertisements of the Sales of Effects taken in execution in the District of *Montreal*, in the *Montreal Gazette*; that this Bill was thrown out by the Assembly, or by the Council, and that the toast was given on that account.

*John Richardson*, Esquire, being again called in, and interrogated upon the sixth of the said toasts, contained in the said printed paper, and upon all those that follow, except the last, answered "that it appears to him to be nearly the substance of the toasts given by Mr. Todd at the said dinner."

The foregoing declarations being read, it was finally

RESOLVED, That it appears to this Committee, that the printed paper mentioned in the resolution of the Assembly of the seventh of this month, is one of the Gazettes printed by Edward Edwards, printer at *Montreal*.

RESOLVED, That it appears to this Committee, that Isaac Todd, of *Montreal*, Esquire, merchant, was President at a dinner given at *Montreal*, in the month of March, 1805; in Dillon's tavern, by the merchants of that City, to the Representatives of the Town and County of *Montreal*, and that he there gave the sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth toasts, inserted in the said printed paper.

On motion of Mr. *Bedard*, seconded by Mr. *Bertelot*,

ORDERED, That the said report be taken into consideration to-morrow.
