

SECRET EYES OF KAISER KEPT WATCH OVER ALL

Hun Spy System Reaches Point of High Perfection in the German Empire, where All Are Under Espionage.

New York, Nov. 29.—The traveller who succeeds in entering Germany in war time must expect to endure all kinds of annoyance, as he is constantly under observation, and is subjected to repeated examinations to prevent him acquiring and carrying away anything which might be useful to the Empire's enemies, says Herbert Bayard Swump, New York World observer in Germany.

The traveller is obliged to report upon arrival at the nearest police station and have his passport visé when he is given permission to remain for a stated period. Each time he makes a trip he must report himself to the police going and coming. Travel is discouraged by imposition of difficulties.

Miles of Red Tape

Eleven separate operations are required to obtain a passport to visit the country, and ten days must elapse between the initial application and actual boarding of a train. These are the days of endless red tape, revisits to numerous departments, answering a multiplicity of questions, reaching the point of actual departure passports must be shown to the numerous inspectors at the stations and on the trains. The hotels are filled with spies in the guise of guests and employes, and the stranger in Germany is never out of sight of Government agents, and the clothing and property of guests in the hotel rooms is thoroughly searched despite fancied protection of locks.

Secret Eyes Spy On All.

Espionage is not confined to Americans in Germany, but embraces even Austrians, Bulgarians and Turks, all must come under the secret eyes and ears of the Kaiser. German spies who travel on all transatlantic liners running from Denmark, Sweden, Norway and Holland to America and back again, and it is their task to find out all they can about their fellow-travellers which may interest the German secret police chiefs.

Submarine Mail Service

Difficultly of communication is a severe hardship in Germany, for mails to and from the Empire are seized by the allies, and if delivered at all are so belated as to make them in many cases of little value. Such cables as the allies choose to permit are transmitted, so that German communication is restricted to the wireless, to supposed neutral countries, and to submarine cables which have been secretly connected to important German mail into Spanish ports, and from thence it is forwarded to the United States and other places, as mail sent out of Spain is not seized and censored by the allies.

TURKS BREAK PROMISE TO U.S.

Rescind Agreement to Allow Americans to Depart From Turkey via Jaffa.

Washington, Nov. 29.—Word that the Turkish Government has rescinded its previous agreement to allow several hundred Americans to leave the Turkish Empire via Jaffa reached the State Department yesterday from Ambassador Eikins at Constantinople. The Ambassador was informed that the Americans cannot be permitted to depart because of military necessity, and that the officials who made the previous agreement spoke without authority.

Diplomacy seems to have been exhausted in the situation, and it is not known what action may be taken in an effort to bring Turkey to terms. The practical internment of the Americans is a source of anxiety to their friends and indignation to the Government. It is said to be an unprecedented situation which will require most delicate handling.

The exact number of persons affected cannot be learned, owing to the fact that direct communication with shore is not permitted. Many are said to be naturalized Syrians and Armenians, though a number of

London, Nov. 29.—The Greek crown council has voted to support the government in opposing the allies' demands for the surrender of arms and munitions, according to an Athens despatch to Reuters yesterday's date. The despatch says this decision was reached after a session of an hour and a half which was presided over by King Constantine.

RUSS MINISTERS CHANGED

London, Nov. 29.—A semi-official despatch from Petrograd says that Count Bobrinski has been removed as minister of agriculture and appointed grandmaster of the imperial court.

Michael De Giers, Russian Ambassador to Rome, will probably be appointed minister of foreign affairs in the new Treppoff cabinet, according to a Petrograd despatch to The Morning Post. The despatch says that, if appointed, M. Giers will pursue the same policy as that associated with the name of Sergius Sazonoff, names by the complete solidarity of Russia and her allies.

GLENOGLE SAILS

Amoy, China, Nov. 28.—The British Steamer Glenogle sailed from this port yesterday evening. She carried no passengers.

The Steamer Glenogle was held up at Amoy on November 21 by the Chinese authorities as she was about to sail for Mesopotamia with a number of Chinese laborers. Germans in Amoy objected to the departure of the vessel on the ground that it was a breach of Chinese neutrality. The contracts with the laborers were also questioned and it was asserted that the ship's voyage violated the treaty with England.
