Sir Wilfrid promised the prohibitionists a plebiscite and declared emphatically that if the country went for prohibition he would give it. The country so declared by a majority of 13,-000 in spite of scandalously stuffed ballot boxes in Quebec. Then Sir Wilfrid repudiated his promise and on the floor of parliament announced as part of his new policy, no prohibition.

And then Mr. Parrott is reported as getting oup in the Bothwell convention and moving a resolution congratulating Sir Wilfrid on that policy. Thus the matter stands: Sir Wilfrid-My policy is not to give

the country prohibition. Bro. Parrott-I beg to sincerely con-

gratulate you, sir, on your policy. The circumstantial evidence that Bro. Parrott moved that resolution is strong. We hope, however, he can prove an alibi. We don't want our faith shattered in humanity so early in the campaign. 

Spearman, Edith Wyatt, Norman Duncan, Clinton Ross, Jack London, and Josiah Flynt and Francis Walton, ranging in subject from a Rocky Mountain construction train and a Klondike cabin to the Syrian quarter in New York and a Spanish-American city in Central America. Miss Wyatt's satirical story of Chicago people, il-lustrated by an artist sent to "the Windy City" for the purpose, enters a new field in periodical literature. Of course these are only a few of the features of this unusually attractive and varied number.

Look These Up.
