COAL SCARE AT AN END

Miners and Operators Sign Agreement For Three Years.

Operators' Original Offer Is Accepted by the Anthracite Workers, Who Show Some Consideration—First General Agreement Signed Between Operators and Miners, and So Constitutes an Advance From Latter's Standpoint.

New York, May 8.—After carrying on negotiations for nearly three months the sub-committees representing the anthracite mine workers and operators of Eastern Pennsylvania yesterday agreed to continue the award of the strike commission for another three years, and the men will return to work as soon as practicable, probably Monday.

All miners who have committed no violence against persons or property will be re-employed, and no one will be discriminated against because of any activity he may have taken in the strike movement. The agreement is subject to the ratification of the tri-district convention of mine workers at Scranton today, but there is not the slightest doubt that the delegates will approve the action of their representatives.

The outcome was looked upon with considerable satisfaction by the coal road presidents, as the agreement entered into is their first proposition made, early in March, in reply to the mine workers' original demands.

The miners had little to say regarding the agreement, except that it was the best they could get. They pointed out, however, that the agreement entered into is the first general agreement that has ever been signed between the operators and miners, and they look upon it as a step forward in their efforts to have regular agreements with their employers.

A reduction of 40 cents a ton in all except the steam sizes of anthracite coal was announced yesterday by the Lehigh Valley Railroad Co.

Winnipeg Painters Strike.

Winnipeg, May 8.—Three hundred union painters walked out on strike yesterday. The demands of the men are for an eight-hour day in the winter and a nine-hour day in summer, together with an increase in wages to raise the minimum pay to 32 1/3 cents an hour, and the maximum pay to 40 cents an hour. A number of the master painters have already signed the new scale.

AYLESWORTH FLUENT.

Surprises House By His Defence Against Mr. Lennox's Attack.

Ottawa, May 8.—During much of the afternoon and all of the evening yesterday the House debated the resolution that it is inexpedient that any member of the Government or deputy member of the Postmaster-General, in an action, suit or proceeding, except where the interests of the Crown are involved, in any court presided over by judges or a judge appointed by the Government of Canada.

Mr. Aylesworth made his maiden speech, and surprised the House by his fluency and vigor, the more so as he had, as usual, affected to be asleep while Mr. Lennox was attacking him. Mr. R. L. Borden answered the arguments of the Postmaster-General. Mr. Fitzpatrick pleased everybody. He defeated Mr. Aylesworth, but betrayed his personal sympathy with the resolution, and closed by moving an amendment to the effect that Ministers and deputy Ministers should devote their time to the performance of their official duties. This was carried by yeas 99, nays 54, and Mr. Lennox's motion was lost on this division reversed.

A Pertinent Question. In completing the bill to incorporate the Grand Trunk Pacific Telegraph Co. was discussed, but Sir Wilfrid asked time to consider this question by Mr. R. L. Borden: "Did the Government purpose to make the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Co. complete its system and retain a title to it, or was it to be alienated in sections so as to reduce our security. If it is time to take over the G. T. P., how much of it are we to get?"

Sir Wilfrid Laurier also parried the request of Mr. Maclean (South York) for some declaration as to the position of the Government on general legislation respecting telegraph and express companies.

THREE MONTHS FOR HOLLAND.

Stole \$13,800 But There Were Some Mitigating Circumstances.

Toronto, May 8.—When Christopher Holland stood yesterday in the police court to receive his sentence for stealing \$13,800 from the Ideal Bedding Co., Magistrate Denison said, before passing a sentence of three months in the Central on Holland, "The lightness of the sentence is due, not to the character of the crime, but the extraordinary and unprofessional conduct in connection with the civil proceedings. I would impose a heavier sentence were it not for these circumstances, which are of so grave a character that I feel you are no worse than others in the case."

Holland and his wife were much relieved at the light sentence. Crown Attorney Corley, yesterday afternoon, forwarded to the discipline committee of the Law Society the papers in the case, which explain the actions and conduct of R. C. Le Vesconte, solicitor for the Bedding Co., in connection with this case. This was done at the request of Magistrate Denison, who so severely criticized Le Vesconte a few days ago.

The magistrate ordered that Holland's personal effects be turned over to Mrs. Holland, remarking that if the Bedding Co. wished to gain possession of them they could enter an action to recover them.

Four Workmen Drowned.

Quebec, May 8.—A drowning accident occurred yesterday morning, when four French-Canadian workmen, fathers of large families, found an unexpected watery grave in the Montmorency River Rapids, at the natural steps, a half mile distance from the Montmorency Falls. Five workmen entered a flat boat to cross the rapids, to reach their work. The boat upset and all five were thrown into the turbulent waters. Only one was saved.

Valletta, Island of Malta, May 8.—Three torpedo boat destroyers sailed from here yesterday to join the British fleet at Piraeus, Greece. The transport Dilwara is now embarking the Worcester-shire Regiment, which will sail for Alexandria, Egypt, to-day.

Throws Himself Under Engine.

Calgary, May 8.—B. Marino, an Italian, who arrived in this city on Friday morning from Cardiff, Ill., deliberately committed suicide by throwing himself in front of a switch engine in the station yards at 10 o'clock Sunday night.
