### ARMISTICE DAY

Armistice Day is to be observed in Wolfville. On Thursday morning of next week—the eleventh day of November—a date made ever memorable by the signing of the Armistice in 1918—the whole community, including the University, and irrespective of denomination, is invited to attend the Baptist church at 11 o'clock. The Boy Scouts, and the Tuxis and College bands combined, will assemble near the High School, where all the pupils, accompanied by the Principal and Teachers, will fall-in, and form a procession, by way of Acadia street, Gasperau avenue and Main street, to the Baptist church. The service is designed to be very simple. The music will be under the direction of Dr. Spidle. A short oration, suitable to the children and the occasion, will be delivered by Prof. Whitelaw, who is a "returned man". The children are to be the central feature of this event, which is being arranged under the auspices of the Civic Club. All the churches and the organizations of the town are earnestly invited to co-operate to make this celebration worthy of the occasion, the College and the Town. It was hoped when the project was first mooted, that the Memorial Gymnasium or the Memorial Tablet, or both, might be ready by November 11th, in which event a more elaborate programme and a more imposing ceremony would be called for. These events will not be long delayed, and the Armistice Day Celebration is the earnest of greater events to follow, and that soon.

### TOWN COUNCIL MEETING

At the regular monthly meeting of the Council on Wednesday evening, Mayor Fitch and all the members were present.

No special business was transacted other than the payment of the usual monthly batch of bills.

Mr. Trask, of the Trask Artesian Well Co., was present, and addressed the Council briefly with regard to the proposition to augment our water supply by boring a well or wells in the vicinity of the reservoir. Mr. Trask, who has had very wide experience, is of the opinion that there is a strong probability that a good supply of excellent water might be obtained by sinking a well from 200 to 300 feet at a cost of from \$1200 to \$1500. Such a well ought to give 25,000 gallons or more per day and in the event of a greater supply being needed additional wells could be bored as needed.

The Council decided to call a meeting of the citizens for next Monday evening to discuss the matter, notice of which will be found in another column.
