WOMEN'S INSTITUTE
The Hon. Dr. R. S. Thornton, Minister of Education was the special speaker at a meeting of the Women's Institute which took place Saturday afternoon at the Y.M.C.A. He chose for his subject "The Foreigner Within Our Gates," which proved most interesting. "The New Canadian," he

called them, for such they are, the children by right of birth and many of the parents by right of naturalization. As Canadians they are entitled to the same privileges as all other Canadians. He urged upon us the responsibility to place within their reach every opportunity that will help to build them up into ideal Canadian citizens. The honorable gentleman was very emphatic in declaring the fact that these people, upon coming to our shores, seek and accept all the rights and privileges that a Canadian citizenship offers. They should also assume a full share of the responsibilities of such and if they refuse, "they should be turned right about face."

Dr. Thornton pointed out the great agency at work to break down the barriers of languages and nationalities and in building up a common nation, is the school. He spoke at considerable length about the noble work of the teachers who are carrying on in these non-English speaking settlements and referred to them as "light bearers in the darkness." In many cases displaying the heroism of missionaries in foreign lands. These schools are laying the foundation and building up the national life of Canada.

The speaker concluded his address by telling how the various organizations are assisting in this work. Wonderful work had been done by the I.O. D.E. by contributing many small libraries and he suggested that the Women's Institute might help in providing dishes and other utensils to serve hot luncheons in these schools.

SURPRISES FOR ALL PARTIES IN IRISH ELECTIONS

Belfast, Jan. 20.—Up to January 15 the Belfast corporation consisted of 52 Unionists and eight Nationalists, but as a result of the elections which ended Saturday, in which the Laborites, Devinites, and Sinn Féiners skillfully bunched votes, it has 37 Unionists, five Nationalists, five Sinn Féiners and 13 Laborites.

The politics of the last-named party ranges from extreme Socialist to Labor Unionist and Orange. The results of the elections generally were of a freak order.

In the Shankill district, a stronghold of Orangism, a Socialist topped the poll, and of the remaining seven members, one was a Socialist and another a Sinn Féiner. In Victoria, which is safe Sinn Féiner territory, a Nationalist headed the poll and a Sinn Féiner and a Laborite also were elected.

The change was not restricted to the Unionists, as in Joseph Devlin's constituency in the Falls division of Belfast, the Constitutional Nationalists polled two seats and a Nationalist has been returned, together with two Sinn Féiners and a Sinn Féin-Laborite.

Sing The Red Flag in Belfast
For the first time in history, the Belfast City Hall was the scene of a speech in Irish, in which the Sinn Féiner, Mr. Carolan of Shankill returned thanks for his election. For the first time also, the City Hall heard the strains of "The Red Flag," which was chorused by exultant Socialists outside.

The alteration in the young power of the city was brought about largely by the Southern Irish invasion of the shilldards to replace men who joined the colors early in the war, before the Government placed an embargo on recruiting from such establishments.

Interest Centres in Derry
Interest now centres on Derry, where the final result in the election will be made known today. The Unionists previously have had a majority of five there, but the utmost they have hoped for in this election is equality in membership, and to insure this, they limited the number of candidates in order to concentrate the votes. The totals in two wards are still to be announced. Both sides voted every available man and woman, but the Nationalists are professing the greater confidence. The object of the struggle is by one side to insure Derry's inclusion in Premier Lloyd George's Ulster scheme, and by the other to be left out of it.

PROHIBITION BILL IN SASKATCHEWAN TO BE CHANGED

Regina, Jan. 20.—While a complete draft of the bill to regulate the sale of liquor which is to be introduced in the Saskatchewan Assembly on Thursday has not yet been made, it is known that the measure will largely embody the proposals made to the Government by the Social Service Council. The essential features of the bill will be the provision requiring druggists to purchase liquor supplies from one wholesale firm to be designated by the Government or a commission, the latter being most likely. The commission will consist of three and have the administration of the act.

DESCHANEL'S ELECTION IS A POPULAR ONE

New President of France Won By a Tremendous Majority

Versailles, Jan. 20.—Paul Deschanel was elected President of the Republic Saturday by 734 votes of the 859 members of the National Assembly voting. His majority was the largest since the election of Louis Adolphe Thiers, the first President after the fall of the Empire, who was chosen unanimously.

The result was certain, since the caucus of yesterday at which M. Deschanel was chosen the candidate of the Senate and Chamber of Deputies, comprising all the various parties.

"The election took on, besides a holiday character, the atmosphere of a patriotic manifestation."

The feeling among the Senators and Deputies was that after the retirement of Premier Clemenceau from the contest, to whom the Parliament was dispossessed to give evidence of the nation's gratitude, it was fitting that the new President should come into power with a vote that would give him the necessary authority to speak impressively for France. The general sentiment is that while M. Deschanel has not won the presidency by such outstanding services as those rendered by Premier Clemenceau, he is a man admirably adapted for the position which requires careful tact, and is above all a safe man.

The proceedings as provided by the constitution were formal, giving little occasion for enthusiasm. When the vote was announced, however, the members of parliament on the floor and he visitors in the galleries joined in a great outburst of acclamation, while former Premier Briand, who is generally credited with a large share in the election of M. Deschanel, declared to a group of friends, "France and the Republic continue."

Madame Deschanel and her children witnessed the demonstration from the gallery and returned to Paris with the President-elect in a motor car. On the journey M. Deschanel was followed by a long cortege of parliamentarians. The procession was watched by thousands along the route through the park of St. Cloud and the Bois du Boulogne, who cheered each car, crying "Long live Deschanel," and "Long live the Republic."

U. S. TO BE BONE DRY UNDER NEW PROHIBITION LAW

Holders of Commercial Stocks of Liquor Must Report to Internal Revenue Bureau

Washington, Jan. 17.—Constitutional prohibition—the dream of reformers for more than a century—became a reality at a minute after midnight Friday night in every nook and corner of the United States and its possessions.

A force of 1,400 special prohibition officials, backed by other Government officials, starts tonight to enforce the letter of the constitutional law. War time prohibition had many leaks, but the nation will be bone dry under the amendment, Daniel Roper, commissioner of internal revenue, predicted, the Volstead law, as applied to constitutional prohibition, giving the Government much greater powers.

The first week of enforcing the law will be to take a complete inventory of all liquor stocks in the country. All holders of liquors except that in private homes for personal use must report it immediately to the Bureau of Internal Revenue. There are heavy penalties for failure to do so.

Preliminary reports to the bureau indicate that huge stocks are still in the country, the owners having failed to export any large quantities. The bureau estimated the amount of whiskey at 60,000,000 gallons, or only a few million less than at the time the Supreme Court dispelled hopes for its sale in this country by upholding war time prohibition on December 15th. Kentucky, having more liquor in bond than any other state, exported only 1,000,000 gallons during December.

What will become of this liquor is up to congress, it was stated at the Bureau, and the general opinion at the capital is that its destruction will be ordered.

JAPS WANT TO HOLD CHINESE GOVERNMENT TO ACCOUNT FOR LOSSES

Peking, Jan. 20.—The Japanese Counsel General at Tien Tsin has addressed a note to the Chinese Commission of Foreign Affairs in that city, declaring that the Japanese Government will hold the Chinese authorities responsible for losses incurred by Japanese merchants, through the boycott of the yarn, piece goods and silk goods and similar Japanese organizations.

CHAIN OF THEATRES ACROSS CANADA

To Be Operated by Famous Players-Lasky Corporation—Further Expansion

Montreal, Jan. 20.—(Canadian Press)—The most important development which has taken place in the Canadian motion picture field was announced by the Royal Securities Corporation here when particulars were given out of a \$10,000,000 transaction under which the Famous Players-Lasky Canadian Corporation, Ltd., will operate a chain of large motion picture theatres from coast to coast.

This company already has in operation approximately twenty motion picture theatres, including six in Toronto, two in Vancouver and others in Ontario and the West, and others will now be constructed in Montreal, Quebec, Vancouver, Winnipeg, Regina, Edmonton, Saskatoon, Halifax and St. John. By the autumn of 1920 the Canadian company expects to have in operation theatres with a total seating capacity of thirty thousand, and by the Spring of 1921 this will be increased to forty-five thousand.

SASKATCHEWAN MAN GIVEN 7 YEAR TERM IN OLD COUNTRY PRISON
Regina, Jan. 20.—E. J. Locke, reported in an English cable as having been sentenced to seven years for shooting at a man following a hold-up of an English bank, is a former resident of Eastend, Sask., where his family still live. Friends say he was a highly respectable farmer who went to London to receive treatment for gland trouble, which caused a secretion of poison said to be likely to affect the mind.
