Mohammedanism.

That Constantinople is today Mohammedan and not Christian is due to the genius of the Turkish sultan, Mohammed II, son of Amurath II, who was born at Adrianople March 24, 1430. His father and grandfather had by successive conquests reduced the Greek empire to the limits of Constantinople itself. When Mohammed became sultan in 1450 he determined to complete the work of conquest by the capture of that city. The siege was commenced April 6, 1453, with an army of 258,000 men and a fleet of 800 vessels. The Greeks, assisted by a gallant band of 2,000 Genoese, made an obstinate resistance. Although a combined attack by land and sea made on the following 29th of May was unsuccessful, the Genoese chieftain, Justiniani, was wounded so severely that he had to retire from the rampart. This produced a panic in the city, and a second Turkish assault, led by the sultan himseif, proved irresistible.
