## PROSPECTS FOR THE POTATO MARKET

Andover, Feb. 17.—In an interview, Guy G. Porter, of the G. G. Porter Co., Ltd., one of the biggest potato shippers in Victoria county, stated that there was a good supply of potatoes on hand and the market was fairly steady, \$2 a barrel being the price that was being paid to farmers at this time. Shipments, both export and local, were good and were meeting an even and steady demand. A cargo of potatoes was being shipped weekly out of St. John to Cuba. Mr. Porter said that he expected the market to continue firm for the balance of the season. As he estimated it, there was between 25 and 30 per cent. of this season's crop still in the country, and half of this was in the dealers' hands, the balance being with the farmers, who were delivering freely at the present price. A price of \$2 seemed to be what most of the farmers expected for their potatoes this year.

## A DOUBLE BEREAVEMENT.

Mr. and Mrs. A. D. G. VanWart, formerly of St. John, died Saturday, at Bagota, N. J.

St. John, Feb. 18.—Relatives in St. John were greatly shocked and grieved to learn of the sudden deaths of both Mr. and Mrs. Abraham D. G. VanWart, of their home in Bagota, N. J., on Saturday. Mrs. VanWart had been in failing health for some time and it is supposed that grief at her death hastened her husband's death. The bodies are being brought to St. John for interment in Fernhill and will probably arrive on Tuesday.

Mr. VanWart was born in Kars, Kings county, in December, 1839, and was 84 last December, but in spite of his advanced age he was active and keenly alert up to the time of his death. Mrs. VanWart was formerly a Miss Gerow, of Wickham, Queens Co., N. B. They also survived by one son, Theodore, and one daughter, Miss Belle, both at home in New Jersey. J. W. VanWart, of St. John, and Coles VanWart, of Woodstock, are nephews and Mrs. J. W. Ellsworth, of St. John, is a niece.

## Six People Now Alleged to Be Involved in Murder of a Game Warden on N. B. Border

Warrant Issued in Connection With Blacquières Murder For Arrest of Emmanuel Michel After Story of Actual Shooting on Metapedia River Bank Had Been Told—Preliminary Investigation This Week.

Rimouski, Que., Feb. 17.—A warrant for the arrest of Emmanuel Michel, on the charge of murder, in connection with the death of Joseph Blacquières, which was signed late yesterday afternoon, brought to six the number of people alleged by the Crown to be involved in the tragedy.

Michel, however, has not yet been apprehended, but the detective admitted that they were on his trail, and that within a week he should be behind the bars with his alleged five accomplices, who are also held for murder.

Magistrate Couillard, who issued the warrant yesterday afternoon, presided over the enquiry, which had been ordered by the Attorney General, and which disclosures were made which resulted in the arrests of Armand Bony and Joseph Richard, who testified that Michel was the man who fired the shot, which had caused the death of Blacquières. Their evidence is alleged to have been corroborated in many respects sufficiently to bring this case to trial.

## Poachers Blamed.

The witnesses heard by the Magistrate were Joseph Beauchemin, Alphonse Beauchemin, Joseph Demers, Rev. The Ross, Dr. Germain, Armand Bony and Joseph Richard. The evidence led to the theory followed by Chief Detective Rioux and endorsed by the Crown to the effect that Blacquières was killed by a member of a group of poachers, who were fishing on the Metapedia River in violation of the regulations enacted by that club.

## Rifle Identified.

According to the two last witnesses heard, the shot was fired by Emmanuel Michel while they were on the opposite bank of the Metapedia River, from where Blacquières was. The rifle alleged to have been used for the shooting was produced by Chief Detective Rioux and identified by one Joseph Michel.

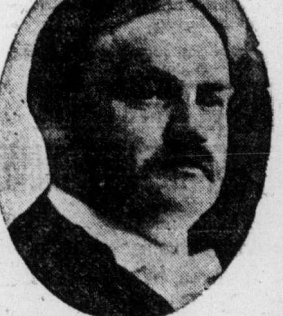
## Houlton Woman Is Candidate For Selectman Job
